ROSTERS OF THE GRADUATING CLASSES 1917 - 1967

With the history of "Flaglers First Families" rapidly disappearing and on learning a few years ago that there is no record in the school system of the graduating classes of Bunnell High School, only individual student records, this seemed to be a much needed work,

Many classes have held reunions through the years and members have kept in touch, However on 12 April 1986 a large scale reunion of Bunnell High School graduates and former students was put together by James Emmett (June) Deen, Jr and his wife Jewel, that included all classes from the class of 1924 through the class of 1943. That was an evening long remembered by all attending and planted the seed for my attempting to put this record together. They very generously gave me a copy of the members of the classes included in the reunion and with that beginning I started compiling other class rosters.

Also upon searching the minutes of the Board of Public Instruction of St Johns County before the creation of Flagler County in 1917 and then the minutes of the Board of Public Instruction of Flagler County from 1917 through 1967 this lead to more data that cried to be told. Thus a history of Bunnell High School was attempted.

With so few of those with personal knowledge of the early days and times to interview and records of early years very sketchy, it is therefore impossible to have a complete history. However have put together all I was able to uncover and hope others might be able to add to this.

In the early years of the public schools in this area many students often had to drop out for varied reasons. Some returned and graduated with a later class. In that era there was not all the social services available and often when family emergencies occured the older children had to help at home. During the "Great Depression" some boys entered C C C Camps for a period of time. Also in those times when couples decided to marry at an early age they no longer attended school. During World War II many boys entered the military service and received their diplomas in the service or returned to school later. Many families removed from the county during a students high school years. So where known these pupils who attended Bunnell High School but for the many varied reasons did not graduate here have been listed sses. with their classes.

Even though several years research have produced a tremendous amount of records of pupils enrolled in Bunnell High School in grades nine through twelve for the years 1917through 1967, it would not be possible to cover a fifty year period without missing some students. For this I am truly sorry and hope such omissions will be forgiven.

When this area was first being settled there were several one room school houses before the turn of the century known as the Miller-Johnston School, St Johns Park School, Gilbert School, Espanola School, etc, then a one room school in what was to become Bunnell, but first known as Bunnell Stop on the railroad, was to later become BUNNELL HIGH SCHOOL.

For many years those one-room schoolhouses were not only used to master the basics of knowledge but they were the center for much of the social life of the community and many times utilized for church services. However as the years passed and these one-room schools were closed, one by one, the students were then transported to the consolated school in Bunnell.

After a four year high school was established and the construction of the large Brick School Building in Bunnell, the spacious auditorum would accommodate large audiences, many community activities were held there. Besides the very enjoyable plays produced by the various high school classes over the years, organizations would sponsor benefit plays of local talent. These often meant a professional director who for a percentage of the profits would furnish all costumes, props, etc, that would be an affair viewed with anticipation by the entire county.

Then the whole area would be abuzz when the Chautauqua would be coming to town, with professional entertainers and speakers. They would have three night programs, as well as a matinee each day, with beautiful costumes and stage sets, Prior to the opening performance they would sponsor a parade with children in costume and the winners would receieve passes to each day and night performance. Of course that usually would mean a 'paid' adult accompanying the student with that coveted 'pass'. However the thrill Audrey Barber and I had winning that greatly desired pass for two years, until we outgrew our costumes, will always be remembered by me. The programs were always held in the High School Auditorum and those three days of the Chautauqua being in town brought a very high standard of entertainment to the area that so many would not have had the opportunity to experience otherwise.

A most interesting article written by Hobart Barber and found by his wife, Bernice, some years after Hob's death is being included although it is of a time prior to the creation of a high school in Bunnell, it gives some unusual

accounts of class activities in the early years of a school in Bunnell. However bear in mind there was a school at Bunnell Stop before 1905, when his narrative begins, and the enrollment would have been greater than the ones he named or the school would have been closed. He probably named the students in his classes.

The abstracts of the minutes of the Board of Public Instruction of St Johns County meetings will be given which contain the first requests for a school at Bunnell Stop.

The abstracts of the minutes of the Board of Public Instruction of Flagler County from the creation of the county in 1917 for fifty years until 1967 will contain many interesting accounts, other than just routine business, such as the hiring of teachers, the decision to build the brick school building, the cost during construction, codes set for teacher conduct, etc. It names those community conscious citizens who served on the Board of Public Instruction and gave so.much of their time in order to have a school the county was so justly proud of where we all received an education comparable to any in Florida. You will note in the minutes they received compensation in the amount of \$4.00 per meeting. Also included are the School Trustees when this information was found.

An article on the basketball and football teams, the establishment of the first cafeteria, the organization of the school band, the Future Farmers of America and the Future Homemakers of America are included.

Though in no way connected with the school, a short article on the C C C Camps is included so those who did not experience the very severe economic time might better understand the reason many boy's education was interrupted for a while.

The rosters of each graduating class, with any interesting information concerning that class and a list of students with that class in high school, who for various reasons did not graduate here has been compiled as accurately as possible.

Being a genealogist and realizing history can not be accurately recorded without identifying the people who created the events, it has required a tremendous amount of research to bring the history and the people together and it is my hope that all will enjoy this book.

'WE WERE HERE' is now recorded for all time.

ABSTRACT OF THE MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION OF ST JOHNS COUNTY from 1893 until the creation of FLAGLER COUNTY in 1917

In order to fully appreciate the struggle the citizens of Bunnell had in securing a school here that eventually lead to the establishment of the first high school, a search of the minutes of the Board of Public Instruction of St Johns County when reference was made to a school in Bunnell revealed the first record of any school in what became the town of Bunnell.

The minutes did not always give complete data on the rural schools so it was not possible to find details such as opening and closing of a school term, names of the teachers, salary paid, etc. One entry directed that any rural school be closed if enrollment fell below 10 pupils.

On 28 June 1893 the board adopted a policy that teachers of rural schools whose average attendance shall reach 20 will receive \$25.00 per month for each month in which such average is maintained, and those attaining an average attendance of 30 shall receive \$30.00 per month and those attaining 35 average attendance shall receive \$35.00 per month as long as such average attendance shall continue.

The board would appoint a man in the community as Trustee or Supervisor of that school for each of the rural schools.

The first mention found of a possible school in Bunnell was on 27 June 1894, "Petition from BRUNNELL asking the establishing of a school", the Superintendent was requested to visit said place and report on same. (Spelling used as found in the records when it is a direct quote)

The minutes did not always record what action was taken on matters and it seemed that possibly the work done between board meetings did not always find its way into the minutes. With no mention of a school in Bunnell after the June meeting until on the 14 September 1894 under teacher appointments, "MISS MARY LUND was assigned to Bunnells". The next entry on 2 July 1895 "School Number 38 - Bunnell's - teacher MISS MARY LUND, salary \$15.00 per month, paid January 1896".

Then on 26 January 1897, "A letter from MRS. S. A. BUNNELL was read asking that a teacher be furnished them for the school at Bunnell. The Secretary was instructed to write MRS BUNNELL that if they could assure an average attendance of 15 pupils the Board would endeavor to secure a teacher".

No reference was found of a school building or where the classes were held.

On 24 February 1897 "A letter from MRS. S. A. BUNNELL at Bunnell was read saying they could secure a teacher for a school at that place. In view of the fact that the teacher referred to did not hold a certificate and that MISS JESSIE WHEELER now teaching at Orangedale would be obliged to close her school at the end of the present month for want of pupils it was voted to appoint MISS WHEELER to teach at Bunnell as soon

as her present school shall close with the understanding that the Board is to pay \$15.00 per month towards her salary and the patrons of the school the balance".

Next reference to Bunnell was on 26 October 1897, "A petition from MRS. S. A. BUNNELL was read asking that they be given a teacher at Bunnell as they had fourteen children of legal age who would attend school. The Secretary was instructed to say in reply that if MRS. BUNNELL could find a properly qualified teacher the Board would pay his salary."

On the 17 June 1898, under teacher appointments, school number 39 (had previously been referred to as school number 38) Bunnell appointment would be deferred until next month.

30 August 1898, "Upon motion it was voted to operate the schools at Bunnell and Salt Branch six months at \$20.00 per month each provided the average was kept up. The Superintendent was instructed to secure teachers for these schools as soon as possible." 31 October 1899, under appointment of teachers number 39 at Bunnell was deferred.

No record was found of the exact dates or length of time a school was actually in operation during these years that MRS. BUNNELL petitioned the board for a school, however the board did mention a school at Bunnell each year from 1895 through 1899.

Noted in the minutes on 3 April 1900 that seven months was the regular term for all county schools, however there were several rural schools in St Johns County at that time that only operated for three and four months terms. There was quite a difference in the treatment of schools in St Augustine and the one teacher rural schools.

The next entry regarding a school in Bunnell was not until 25 February 1907, "A petition was read from MR I. I. MOODY and others residing in Bunnell, asking that a school be established at that point. The board deeming it unadvisable to establish a new school so late in the school year, declined to grant the request, but agreed to establish the school next year provided a school house is erected by the patrons." On 26 August 1907, "Petition was read from residents of Bunnell representing that there are residing in that district sixteen children of school age, out of reach of school, and ask that a school be established at that point. The request was granted upon the petition and a verbal statement from MESSRS LAMBERT and I. I. MOODY, who were present at the meeting, that the patrons would build the school house without cost to the school board. The board to furnish seats for the same."

No teacher was named, neither was there any other mention, if a school did operate in Bunnell that year, but on 30 June 1908 under teacher appointments MISS FLORENCE LOVELL was named for school number 40, Bunnell, \$35.00 per month. (Bunnell school had previously been numbers 38 then 39)

On 22 June 1909 MISS MINNIE JOHNSTON was appointed to school number 40, Bunnell, \$35.00 per month for 6 months.

On 6th July 1909, "Letter was read from I. I. MOODY of Bunnell in which he expressed his willingness to donate to the board a school site at Bunnell, and stated that he was erecting a school building on the proposed site. He also requested that the board assist him in defraying the expense of building. The Superintendent was instructed to visit Bunnell and investigate conditions." On 2 August 1909, "The Board ordered that JAMES BURNSED be allowed \$10.00 per month for conveying the pupils from the district known as the 'Miller - Johnston' district to the Bunnell School during the 1909-10 school term."

Construction of the school had begun for on 20 September 1909, "Letter was read from I. I. MOODY of Bunnell in which he asked the Board to allow him \$250 instead of \$200 (allowed at last meeting) to be applied to the construction of a school house at Bunnell. The Board agreed to pay \$200 now as authorized and the balance of \$250 at such time as there are sufficient pupils attending the school to warrant a second room and two teachers."

You can see from the above that the minutes of the Board did not reveal all business they transacted and often when a matter was deferred to the next meeting no mention was made in the following minutes.

However the minutes did show that a building was constructed and that MISS MINNIE JOHNSTON was paid \$40.00 per month from October 1909 through May 1910. And MR. I. I. MOODY was paid \$200.00 for the purchase of the school site on 1 November 1909.

MISS STELLA MARTIN was appointed to school number 40, Bunnell, salary \$40.00 for the term 1910-11. The Superintendent was authorized to furnish desks, maps, charts, viz for Bunnell school. In July 1911 MISS LOLA CALLAWAY was appointed to school number 40, Bunnell, salary \$40.00, and the "Superintendent was authorized to offer \$50.00 and if necessary \$60.00 per month for a male principal for the Bunnell School." Superintendent was also authorized to purchase blackboards for Bunnell School.

On 2 January 1912, "The Superintendent was instructed to write I. I. MOODY, Supervisor of School Number 40 at Bunnell and request him to have the said number 40 schoolhouse ceiled and present the bills for the same to this board for payment. On 2 April 1912 the term for school number 40 at Bunnell was extended to eight months, and the Superintendent was instructed to purchase for the Bunnell School number 40 four lots adjoining the said school site, price of three of said lots to be \$25 each and the fourth one \$50." "The Superintendent was instructed to draw a warrant in favor of F. L. BYRD for \$150.00 account of salary." No mention of MR BYRD being hired was found and it was not noted for how many months the \$150.00 covered.

"Deed for three lots adjoining number forty school site at Bunnell from LAMBERT and MOODY was read and accepted. And the Superintendent was instructed to draw a warrant for Seventy Five (\$75,00) dollars in favor of LAMBERT and MOODY in payment of said lots" on the 7 May 1912.

On 2 July 1912, "It was ordered that two teachers be employed in the Bunnell School number 40 and the salaries for principal and assistant shall be \$50 and \$40 respectively per month," However the following March the patrons of Bunnell School requested the principal be paid \$10 per month more for the balance of the term and it was granted.

The next entry concerning Bunnell School was in June 1913 when LAMBERT and MOODY were paid \$16.15 for window shades, and a MR and MRS . W. F. BROWN were appointed teachers for the school but it was found they did not hold Florida teachers certificates, then B. F. BUCHANAN was employed as principal \$75.00 per month and BESSIE BUCHANAN for \$50.00 per month and the term was eight months. They were rehired in June 1914 for the year \$1914-\$15 for the same salaries.

The next request noted from patrons of Bunnell School was 6 April 1915, "A request was received from patrons of school number 40 at Bunnell asking the Board to establish a high school at Bunnell. The Superintendent was authorized to investigate the proposition and report his findings to the board." In August the Superintendent was authorized to have a room prepared in the Bunnell School for the accomodation of the principal of that school wherein he could teach the ninth and tenth grades. And teachers appointed were Professor Malphurs, \$75.00 per month, Carrie Baker, \$50.00 per month and Genie Casey, \$45.00 per month In April \$3.00 was paid to the Bunnell Ice, Light and Water Company for water rent for three months.

Teachers appointed in October 1916 for Bunnell School number 40 were: Professor M. S. Hayes, \$75.00; Susie Lambert, \$50; and Ruth Malphurs, \$45. In November 1916 the Superintendent reported that the Supervisor of the Burnell School had employed an extra teacher. The board instructed the chairman and Superintendent to investigate the matter and report back to the board whether or not it was necessary to employ said teacher permanently. The Bunnell Hardware Company was paid \$1.70 for sanitary supplies and 40¢ for repairs, and the Bunnell Mercantile Company paid \$4.10 for curtain cloth.

This concluded the search of minutes of the St Johns County Board of Public Instruction's meetings as the process of forming the new county of Flagler was under way and following a straw ballot of the citizens of the area to become Flagler County, Governor Sidney Johnston Catts had appointed B. F. BUCHANAN, Superintendent of Public Instruction for Flagler County and J. J. BUCKLES, F. L. BYRD and Z. E. BOOE to serve as members of the School Board, and W. H. MCKENZIE as Truant Officer.

ABSTRACT OF THE MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION

FLAGLER COUNTY, FLORIDA 1917 - 1967

FIRST SCHOOL BOARD MEETING WAS HELD, JULY 3, 1917

This Organizational Meeting is recorded in its entirety. Subsequent minutes have been abstracted.

STATE OF FLORIDA, COUNTY OF FLAGLER

In pursuance to Section 6 Chapter 7399, Acts of 1917, Laws of Florida, the members of the Board of Public Instruction of Flagler County, Florida, appointed on the 25 day of June, A.D. 1917, held their first meeting at Bunnell, Florida, on the first Tuesday in July, A.D. 1917, at nine O'clock A.M.

There were present at said meeting F. L. Byrd, of Bunnell, Florida, residing in and representing School District No. 1, Zeb E. Booe, of Dupont, Florida, residing in and representing School Board District No. 2, and J. J. Buckles, of R. F. D. No. 1, Bunnell, Florida, residing in and representing School Board District No. 3.

Thereupon the Board of Public Instruction of Flagler County, Florida, proceeded to complete the organization of said Board in compliance with Section 342, General Statues of Florida, as follows:

On motion of Mr. J. J. Buckles, seconded by Mr. F. L. Byrd, Mr Zeb E. Booe was elected chairman of said Board of Public Instruction for the County of Flagler, State of Florida.

Mr. B. F. Buchanan, having been on the 25th day of June, A. D. 1917 appointed County Superintendent of Public Instruction for Flagler County, appeared in person at said meeting and assumed his duties as Secretary of said Board, as provided by law.

Before me, a Notary Public, personally appeared Zeb E. Booe and B. F. Buchanan. Both to me well known, each being duly sworn, say that the above and foregoing account of the proceedings of the organization of the Board of Public Instruction for the County of Flagler, State of Florida, is correct, and a true copy of the original as recorded in their book of mimutes.

After completing the organization of the School Board, a motion was made by Mr. F. L. Byrd and seconded by Mr. J. J. Buckles, instructing the Secretary to communicate with the Circuit Court of Volusia and St Johns Counties respectively, requesting each to prepare and furnish

sufficient data, from which, the School Boards of Volusia and Flagler, in joint session: Also the School Boards of St. Johns and Flagler Counties, in a joint session,— could formulate a plan or plans whereby Flagler County could assume its prorata share of indebtedness and secure its pro rata of all money, if any, in the school fund on hand the first of July 1917.

The Secretary was also instructed to communicate with the Secretaries of Volusia and St. Johns Counties respectively asking each to inform the Secretary of Flagler County, on what date, would be suitable for a joint session, mentioned above, for a settlement, by an equitable divisions of funds and indebtedness.

There being no other business before the Board, a motion was made by Mr. J. J. Buckles and seconded by Mr. F. L. Byrd and unanimously carried, that meeting adjourn to a time designated, by the Secretary's call.

On the 14 July 1917 the Board of Public Instruction of Volusia and Flagler Counties met in joint session.

It was agreed that "in as much as the assessed valuation of the detached portion of Volusia County, now known as Flagler County is 2.95% of the assessed valuation of the entire county, it was decided to make settlement of cash balance on this basis." The check to Flagler County for their pro rata share was in the amount of \$384.13.

Necessary papers were executed assigning all real and personal property owned by the Board of Public Instruction of Volusia County situated in that portion of Volusia County, detached and now known as Flagler County, to Flagler County Board of Public Instruction.

The Board of Public Instruction for St Johns and Flagler Counties did not agree on equable terms until on 6 August 1918 Board members Zeb E. Booe, J. J. Buckles and F. L. Byrd met with the St Johns Board of Public Instruction and the Flagler County Board agreed to assume 8.2% of the school indebtedness and that they would receive 8.2% of the assets as settlement.

More detailed information concerning the schools of Flagler County can now be found in the minutes of the Board of Public Instruction since we are no longer the step-children in education. It being mostly routine business of hiring teachers, maintaining buildings, etc., will only give the accounts that seem interesting or unusual.

There were grammar schools, mostly one teacher schools, operated in various sections of the county at Haw Creek, Matazanas, Ocean City, Gilbert, Malphurs, Espanola, St Johns Park, the Hammock (or Hensen), Korona, Codyville, Black Point, St Joe and Dupont. However all high school pupils were transported to Bunnell High School. Remember this is only the second term to be called a high school and that only through the tenth grade.

The first regular session of the Board was held on 16 July 1917. Date for school to open was 3 September 1917. Of interest might be the first annual school budget to be adopted for Flagler County on 4 August 1917;

A resolution was adopted that a tax of 7 mills on the dollar of all taxable property in Flagler County be levied for the year 1917 for the support of the public free schools of Flagler County.

J. J. Johnson of the Orange Hammock community had deeded one acre to the Board for a school to be erected on but for reasons not stated in the minutes the school was not built and the property was deeded back to J. J. Johnson.

This first list of teachers as paid 6 October 1917 for September work might also be interesting, especially the salary, however the school in which they taught was not named.;

In November all schools were notified that they had to furnish their own wood but in December the Board rescinded this action and agreed to pay for same. The three school districts were now referred to as Bunnell, Haw Creek and St Johns Park Districts in the minutes. The first mention of janitorial work was 1 December 1917, \$11.00 paid Lafayette Golden and again April he was paid \$6.00.

Bunnell School was becoming more consolidated for in April 1918 the school buildings at Haw Creek, Matanzas and Espanola were sold. The first mention of Trustees for the school districts named, W. M. Richardson, R. W. Cody and J. E. Hedden for Haw Creek District.

At this time the school board members were paid \$4.00 and \$t Johns Park and Haw Creek members were allowed \$2.50 per diem. The trustees never received any compensation.

In August 1918 Rev. R. L. Ramsey was appointed Principal of Bunnell School and M. S. Hayes as first assistant. Trustees for Special Tax District (Bunnell) were J. F. Lambert, O. G. Henderson and Ray Hendricks. A mimeograph was purchased for Bunnell School in October.

The first account of teachers being paid for the 1918-19 term was 5 October 1918 and were listed in no particular order and school where they taught not designated;

In the minutes of 5 October 1918 the salary of Superintendent E. B. Loughridge of \$100.00 was paid. No mention of a special election or the appointment of a new Superintendent, however the last minutes signed by B. F. Buchanan were 6 July 1918 and since that time E. B. Laughridge's name was typed in as Superintendent and the minutes were not signed by the chairman of the board and no name typed in for chairman.

On 2 November 1918 "A motion was made and unanimously carried that the teachers of schools which have been ordered closed by the County Council of National Defense during the epidemic of Influenza be paid their salaries in full for the time the schools were closed". The new teachers added to the payroll in November were Helen Trueman, Mary B. Grange, Loretta Heacock, Mary Lafferty and Emma Bachelder. The name Marguerite Burnsed was now entered as Marguerite Buzzard, do not know which was the correct name.

There did not seem to be any permanent arrangement for janitor work yet as during the 1918-19 term, E. B. Laughridge was paid \$12.00,

N. Swanson \$5.00, Jack Clinton \$3.00, Minnie Beatty \$5.00 & \$10.00, Ella Paterson \$5.00, for janitorial work. Twice H. M. Swanson was paid \$4.00 as Scavanger for Bunnell School. In 1919 the budget included \$100.00 janitor for all school. That fall H. M. Swanson was hired as Scavanger for Bunnell School for \$8.00 a month and E. Hance Janitor for \$15.00 a month. The next school term their pay was raised to \$15.00 a month for E. Hance and \$12.00 a month for H. M. Swanson. By 1923 E. Hance was paid \$25.00 a month and J. W. Williams \$25.00 a month as Scavanger.

At the regular meeting of the School Board on 4 January 1919 the members of the board were F. L. Byrd Chairman, I. H. Friar and Zeb E. Booe and E. B. Loughridge, Superintendent. However on 1 March 1919, Ed Johnson was paid the salary of \$100 as Superintendent. There was no account of an election and a new Superintendent being sworn in. Even though more information was recorded in the minutes since Flagler County was created there was still a good amount of business transacted between meetings that was never entered in the minutes.

In May 1919 the Trustees for Special Tax District No. 2 were J. F. Lambert, Thos. E. Holden and J. R. Henderson and for District No. 1, Will Richardson, Lionel L. Janes and John Kendall. In July L. A. Jett was awarded a contract for an addition to Bunnell School for \$1,220.65. In August J. M. Syfrett was hired as principal for Bunnell School, salary \$150.00 month. Mr. Booe has not been present for Board meetings since January. Teachers salaries were raised from \$60 to \$75 a month.

According to an article in the Flagler Tribune 4 September 1919 the teachers for the Bunnell School were, Professor J. M. Syfrett, Pauline Henderson, Allie Cochran, Mrs W. C. King and Emilie Spink.

On 5 June 1920 G. W. Lee was appointed principal for Bunnell School with salary of \$150.00 per month for 8 months. In July the Board again had three members, F. L. Byrd, I. H. Friar and W. E. Knight and Ed Johnson, Superintendent, and W. H. Deen was elected Attendance Officer for \$500 per year, and in August W. H. Deen was appointed to take a census of all school children in the County and to be paid \$200.00. Several more small schools were closed and the pupils transported to Bunnell. Although G. W. Lee's salary was to be \$150 per month in November he was paid \$187.50 and the teachers had been raised again from \$75 to \$90 per month. The teachers on the November pay roll for the entire county were Amelia Boor, Allie Cochran, Ola Barber, M. E. Bailey, Etha Clayton, Ruby St Claire, F. W. Parker, Mrs A. A. Walker, Mrs F. W. Parker, Mary Rice, Orvill Cobb, Emilee R. Church, Ruth Richardson, Emma Bachelder, Anna R. Brackney, Mrs C. A. Burnsed and Emielee Bohanan.

Regular meeting of the Board on 8 January 1921 listed W. H. McKenzie Chairman, W. E. Knight and W. R. Malphurs and D. B. Brown Superintendent. W. D. Deen "has formed business associations which will of necessity require his absence from the county for a good portion of his time" so he will no longer be attendance officer. In April G. W. Lee was appointed for the next school term at a salary of \$225 per month. (The minutes are now very hard to read in many places) In June a teachers salary schedule was adopted, First Grade Certificate \$80 per month, Second Grade Certificate \$75 per month and Third Grade Certificate \$70 per month. At the June meeting "The Chairman (W. H. McKenzie) informed

the board that he would go with them on a tour of inspection when he had gotten his dinner and not before". In June 1921 the Trustees for Special Tax District No 1 were J. W. Rice and John Kendall; for Tax District No 2, J. F. Lambert and Tom E. Holden; and for District No 3, Howard Schwartz, J. W. Malphurs and J. R. Johnson.

Again with no mention of an election or special appointments on 1 October 1921 the Board members paid were R. W. Malphurs \$6.20, W. E. Knight \$6.00 and W. H. Deen \$4.00 and D. B. Brown Superintendent \$125.00. And with the list of paid bills the following teachers were paid; G. W. Lee, Principal, Etha Clayton, Allie Cochran, Ola Barber, L. W. Jenkins, Angie Thomas, E. J. Mazurewicz, Daisy Walker, Chas. Edsel, C. A. Burnsed, Erma Bachelder, Mae H. Williams, Ruth Richardson, Emile Church, Anna Brackney and E. Hance was paid \$15 as janitor. Later that term Donnella Deen was paid \$18.75 as a substitute teacher (she was a high school student at that time).

The wonderful news for this term was the addition of the 11th grade with the 12th to be added next year and the first class to graduate from the 12th grade would be the spring of 1924.

For the school term 1922-23 the payroll for November showed the roster of teachers to be; E. F. Fender, Principal Bunnell, F. H. Bache, Etha Clayton, Allie Cochran, Ola Barber, Daisy Walker, Mrs. Fender, Phyllis Hazen, A. H. Johnson, Annie L. Smith, Rosalee Simms, Fred Cox, Myrtle Proctor, Bessie Johnson, Ruth Richardson, Frances Southwick, and Equilla Dixon. At the Board meeting on 6 January 1923, W. H. Deen was elected Chairman and the new members of the Board were H. A. Eisenbach and J. J. Buckels (he signed it thus) with D. B. Brown Superintendent.

The next big news from the minutes was on 5 May 1923 when a petition was presented by "various" qualified voters residing in Special Tax District No 2 that Special Tax District No 2 issue special bonds in the sum of \$75,000.00 for a new school and an election be held for this purpose. The special election was held on 20 July 1923 and 53 voted for the bond issue and 42 voted against. Canvas of the election was signed by W. H. Deen, H. A. Eisenbach, J. J. Buckels and D. B. Brown as Secretary. A typed report of canvas was attached to the minutes with original signatures.

It still not being possible to determine which teachers were assigned to the Bunnell School, will give list of teachers paid 6 October 1923; C. D. Johnson, Principal, Virginia Tiller, Clara Herlong, Frances Cochran, Ella Scarborough, Ola Barber, Bessie Allen, Allie Cochran, Nannie Watson, Emmit D. Anderson, Pearl Parker, Ruth Richardson, G. J. North. And the payroll for Transportation was to the following persons; J. A. Kronowski, Mae Keifer, C. K. Kendall, C. B. Miller, Z. G. Holland, Tom Richardson, Dale Brown, H. J. Hosford, M. R. Bovis, A. W. Kennand, R. L. Smith, Dean Holland, and J. D. Parker. Some of these were for operating a bus route and some for transporting a few pupils to the bus route or school. In November the Board instructed C. B. Miller, a driver of a bus transporting children to the Bunnell School, that no person under the influence of whiskey can ride on such while pupils are being transported.

On 12 October 1923 W. B. Talley of Lakeland, Florida was employed as architect for the new school building. Bid of Arthur Ittman was accepted for the construction of the new school on 17 November 1923 and the George Moody location was accepted. In January 1924 George Moody was paid \$1,000.00 blocks 22, 23, 29, and 30 in the Town of Bunnell as recorded in Deed Book 5 page 271. Each block contained 12 lots.

On 2 February 1924 the first payment on construction of the new school was made to Arthur Ittman for \$1,292.00 and \$32.30 to W. B. Talley, 2½% estimate number 1 and \$3,000.00 to the Town of Bunnell for water. Several accounts of purchase of books for the library were made in reference to the requirements for accreditation.

Next payment on 1 March 1924 to A. E. Ittman for \$2,036.80 and to W. B. Talley for \$50.92. Trustees named were District No 1, Will Richardson, John Kendall and A. W. Hall; District No 2, J. F. Lambert, Tom Holden and Mrs Marjorie Varn; District No 3, Howard Swartz, J. W. Malphurs and E. F. Warner.

On 5 April, A. E. Ittner was paid \$10,817.60 and W. B. Talley \$271.17. Payment on 3 May 1924 was Ittner \$6,216.80 and Talley \$155.42. On 5 July 1924 Ittner paid \$10,072.00 and Talley \$251.58 and George Moody paid \$500.00 for a house and lot.

The 2 August 1924 meeting of the Board with all members present "moved and seconded that the Board take over new building September first".

Two payments were made in August to Ittner, \$7,360.00 and \$4,000.00 and to Talley \$184.00 and \$100.00.

With the opening of the school term in the new building 1924-25 term, L. B. Bratcher was hired as janitor for \$65.00 per month and furnished a house. The first payroll on 4 October 1924 for all schools listed J. D. Wheeler, Principal Bunnell High School, Virginia Tiller, Ella Mae Robison, O. V. Witt, H. G. Mathews, S. J. Moore, Lucile Henderson, Ola Barber, Pearle Parker, Christine Sparkman, Nannie Watson, L. B. Lewis, Mrs L. B. Lewis, C. B. Knight, Sophie Southwick and Ruby King.

On 4 October 1924 final payment was made to A. E. Ittner \$9,563.00 and to W. B. Talley \$239.00 and in December A. E. Ittner was paid \$39.00 for wiring at school building.

Now the beautiful brick building for Bunnell High School, of which we were so very proud, was completed and ready for classes for the 1924-1925 term of school, for a total cost of;

At the Board meeting on 6 January 1925, present were W. H. Deen, Chairman, Harry Clegg and Henry Salyerds. At a reorganizational meeting of the Board on the 14 March 1925 the members were George L. Biddle, Harry Clegg and Henry Salyerds.

Teachers for Bunnell High School for the 1925-26 term were J. D. Wheeler, Principal, Ella Mae Robinson, Mary F. Jones and Ruby C. Dolquist.

When the first hard rains came it was a terrible disappointment to everyone to discover that water seeped into the basement and on 2 January 1926 the Secretary was instructed to write Mr. Talley and get his opinion as to the best way to keep water out of the basement of the new school building. Though many solutions were tried this problem was to continue to plague the school for all the years to come.

Mr. Joseph D. Wheeler presented his resignation to the board to be accepted at once on 30 January 1926 and Mrs Jones and Miss Dolquist were to be paid \$65 each, to be acting principal and assistant, per month.

The high school teacher roster for 1926-27 was, John M. Hudnall, principal, Mary F. Jones, Nora Miller, Ruby C. Dahlquist and Giles W. Bethea .

On 8 January 1927 the new board was seated with George L. Biddle, Harry Clegg and John O. Buckles and the Superintendent D. B. Brown. Times were getting a little tight and on 15 January "F E C was asked to advance the balance of their tax to help us in carrying the schools". The board had to borrow money during this term and one month the teachers pay was in two installments, and on July 1st they issued tax anticipation notes in the amount of \$17,000.00.

School opened on 3 October 1927 with the following high school teachers, G. D. Pinholster, principal, Mary F. Jones, William J. Hamrick and C. E. Perkins. Money was still a problem for there was over \$40,000 in unpaid taxes due from 1927 taxes and in November 1927 the Board had to borrow \$4,000 from the bank. The Superintendent was now receiving \$200.00 per month and the Board Members still \$4.00 per meeting with mileage. In May 1928 they again issued \$17,000 in Tax Anticipation notes.

In June 1928 the Board adopted a budget of \$22,000.00 with school tax to be 10 mills and a 5 mill tax in the special school district. The high school teachers for the 1928-29 term to be G. D. Pinholster, Principal, William J. Hamrick, C. H. Hudson, Gladys Clark and Rachel A. Parrott for the new Home Economics Department.

Regular meeting 8 January 1929 seated the Board Members, W. H. Deen, Harry Clegg and J. O. Buckles and Zeb E. Booe as Superintendent and Secretary. The minutes noted on 14 January 1929 that Lois Hart had won the Ruth Bryan Owen Scholarship to Miami University for this County. On 2 March 1929 it was moved, seconded and carried that Superintendent's salary be raised from \$150.00 to \$200.00 a month as this action was not properly entered in the minutes when this voted the 19 June 1926.

In April 1929 it was reported that the cost of schools was greater than revenue (as was the case over the entire state) and that a 10% reduction be made in teachers salaries and all fixed charges for the school year 1929-30. It was reported that a "maximum of debt" had already accumulated and the 10% cut or a shorter school term would have to be made. Teacher salaries were made more uniform. In June 1929 Tax Anticipation notes of \$14,000 were issued.

For the 1929-30 term it was voted to pay teachers in 10 payments for the 8 months school. The teachers were, G. D. Pinholster, Principal; William J. Hamrick, Spanish and math; Mary F. Jones, history and English; M. F. Keister, math and Latin and boys coach; Cecile Strickland, home economics, science and girls coash. That year a student broke the glass in the door to the boys toilet at B H S and the father was notified that he is expected to have a new glass installed.

It was noted on I February 1930 that the Cyclone which passed through Orange Hammock on January 29th wrecked the negro school.

On 10 May 1930 a motion by Clegg, seconded by Buckles and unanimously carried that the following rule be adopted, "That whenever any teachers conduct and influence shall, in the opinion of the Board of Public Instruction, become objectionable and detrimental to the best interest of the school in which employed, from lack of social, school or religious spirit; keeping late night hours; associating with questionable company; playing cards; dancing; the use of tobacco or intoxiating beverages in any form whatever; or any other conduct unbecoming to the teaching profession, the said Board of Public Instruction may at once terminate the contract of such teacher, after having furnished said teacher a copy of this rule at time of signing contract, and by giving written notice to said teacher, stating the reasons therefor, accompanied by a check for payment of salary in full to date of notice". Signed by Z. E. Booe, Secretary and W. H. Deen, Chairman.

Budget for the term 1930-31 was to be \$26,712.00. Principal for B H S was G. D. Pinholster and teachers were C. L. Dodson, Frances O' Dell, Mary F. Jones and Ruth Wethington. In October 1930 Southwestern Waterproofing Corporation of Atlanta, Georgia was employed to waterproof the basement for \$217.50. The matter of medical examination of children to meet regulation for standardization discussed and chairman was to confer with Dr. Carter. The following January an arrangement for the school nurse from Daytona to make health inspections for \$25.00. On 16 January 1931 the new school board was seated; M. B. Fuller, Chairman, K. K. Knight and Grace S. Lord, with Zeb E. Booe, Secretary.

T. W. Bessant of Kay Bee Construction Company of Bunnell was employed to install a pump in the basement to pump the water out. Cost to be \$131.34.

Budget for the 1931-32 term of \$31,383.00 was approved on 5 September 1931. Teachers employed were, P. K. Platts, Principal, teachers; R. B. Orr, Frances O'Dell, Ruth Wethington and Willie Leggitt. The first reference to a school cafeteria found in the minutes was when Mrs. Minnie Deen made reports showing balance on hand for September 1931 of \$37.79 and October \$45.29, as manager of the school cafeteria, so it is assumed operation was begun at the term of 1931-32. The Board decided that the cafeteria should be self sustaining and approved the purchase of an ice box from the cafeteria fund. (See additional information on the operations of the cafeteria under a chapter entitled CAFETERIA) Principal Platts requested permission to move the old water cooler into the school cafeteria room and convert it into a small compartment ice box for use in that room. On 2 April 1932 W. J. Kinney was appointed by the Governor as a member of the Board to fill the unexpired term of Mrs Grace S. Lord who had resigned.

On considering teachers for the 1932-33 term one teacher was not re-elected'on account of lukewarm attitude and unbecoming conduct at certain social events' and one was re-elected'on condition of attending school, church attendance and better school room attitude'. Budget of \$27,352.00 was adopted in July and 10 mills tax for all of county plus district taxes.

Teacher roster for the high school for 1932-33 term; P. K. Platts, Principal, Roy L. Crosby, Frances O'Dell, Ruth Wethington and Willie Leggett.

Board meeting of 3 December 1932, "Principal Platts discussed with the Board the cases of two boys in school, explaining the long tolerance and persuasion of their teachers, that they are not making passing grades in their subjects and due to their lack of interest and idleness they are distrubing elements in school. The Board approved the expulsion of one and the suspension of the other for the balance of this semester and at the beginning of the next semester give him a two weeks trial and if his work and behavior is satisfactory, to continue in school, but otherwise, expell him for the balance of the year". Teachers were paid 40% of their salary for October and November and 80% in December.

The Board Members seated on 7 January 1933 were; K. K. Knight, Chairman, W. H. Deen and W. J. Kinney and Zeb E. Booe Secretary. Teachers were paid 80% of salary for January and February and paid 25% of 80% for March.

Meeting of 8 March 1933 - Governor David Scholtz declaring a Bank Moratorium in the State of Florida the Bunnell State Bank closed at noon, Saturday, March 4th. School deposits for the General Fund were \$1,648.01; District #1 \$60.23; District #2 \$174.31; District #3 \$134.29. On 1st April teachers were paid 25% of 80% - credit was obtained for rooms and board and gas and oil for buses, etc, for now. Payment was made by vouchers but could not determine where money was deposited.

The school cafeteria was still operating in the black however and on 3 June 1933 - "Mrs Minnie Deen, Bunnell School Cafeteria operator report of the school year operations which showed a cash balance of \$11.23. Mrs Deen was highly commended for the efficient manner in which she handled the business."

On 22 July 1933 The Palatka Atlantic National Bank was selected as depository for school funds. In September notes were given to all teachers and transportation contractors for balance due them for the 1932-33 term at 8% interest. In October the teachers were instructed to base their work on a six months term and six hour day but proceed from month to month. Teachers for 1933-34 were; P. K. Platts, Principal, Frances O'Dell, Roy L. Crosby and Corinne Van Iderstine.

Because of the very troubled times financially the minutes of the meeting on 4 November 1933 and the copy of letter to patrons and citizens will be printed in full so that you will know how desperate the situation was;

November 4, 1933

"The Board of Public Instruction met in regular monthly session. Members Knight, Kinney, Deen and Secretary Booe present. Minutes of the meetings held October 6, 7, 9, 21 and 28 read and adopted."

"On October 31 the following circular letter was sent out:"

TO THE SCHOOL PATRONS AND CITIZENS OF FLAGLER COUNTY:

THE SCHOOL ESTABLISHMENT IN FLAGLER COUNTY IS JUST ON THE BRINK OF COLLAPSE. SCHOOLS WILL BE FORCED TO CLOSE FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 10th, THE END OF ONE MONTH, IF THE PEOPLE OF THE COUNTY DO NOT COME TO THE RESCUE.

THE SCHOOL BOARD HAS DONE EVERY THING POSSIBLE WITHIN ITS POWER TO DO. THE TEACHER COST HAS BEEN REDUCED FROM \$15,748.00 LAST YEAR TO \$10,920.00 THIS YEAR. TRANSPORTATION HAS BEEN REDUCED FROM \$8,806.00 TO \$4,856.00 AND EVERY OTHER ITEM OF EXPENSE HAS BEEN REDUCED TO THE MINIMUM OR CUT OUT ENTIRELY.

STATE REVENUES ARE ESTIMATED BY STATE AUTHORITIES TO BE ABOUT \$3,500.00 LESS THIS YEAR THAN LAST YEAR. COUNTY REVENUES HAVE BEEN RAPIDLY DECREASING. IN 1931 THE TAX COLLECTIONS WERE 36% LESS THAN IN 1930. THE 1932 TAXES COLLECTED ARE 50% LESS THAN 1931. THERE IS NO TELLING WHAT FURTHER DECREASE IN REVENUE RECEIPTS THERE MAY BE THIS YEAR.

THIS APPALLING DECREASE IN TAX PAYMENTS HAS REACHED THE POINT OF TURNING OUT CHILDREN OUT OF SCHOOL. CITIZENS, ARE YOU GOING TO SUFFER THAT IT BE DONE?

THE ANSWER TO THIS QUESTION MUST BE MADE TO THE BOARD OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION NEXT SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 4th, AT 2 O'CLOCK P. M. IN A MEETING TO BE HELD IN THE COURT ROOM AT BUNNELL.

THIS IMPENDING CRISIS MAY BE AVERTED FOR A TIME BY THE PEOPLE BACKING THE SCHOOL BOARD FOR A TEMPORARY LOAN.

CITIZENS. THIS IS NOW YOUR PROBLEM. IT IS ALL IMPORTANT THAT YOU ATTEND THIS MEETING.

BOARD OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION, FLAGLER COUNTY, FLORIDA

"In response to this letter a good number of representative citizens of the county attended the meeting to hear a statement of school finances and to deliberate on ways and means of carrying on the schools. It was shown that a sufficient loan against state fund anticipations to take care of teachers salaries for some time to come had been approved by the depository Bank, but that a loan against County revenue anticipations would not be made except under certain requirements that would be difficult to meet, and as there are no current County funds on hand, it is therefore proposed to the people that they made small individual loans to the Board, sufficient to pay for the first month's transportation cost, \$607.00. Citizens promptly volunteered to make loans, payable on demand with 8% interest, as follows: L. E. Wadsworth \$100.00, B. C. Stafford \$100.00, T. E. Holden \$100.00, M. C. Strickland \$100.00, Joseph Stanish \$50.00, E. F. Warner \$50.00, A. C. Rodgers \$50.00, T. W. Bessant \$50.00, and Thomas Bertha \$50.00, Total, \$650.00. The Secretary was ordered to draw notes accordingly and to deliver to these individuals upon the payment of their respective amounts. Other citizens expressed their willingness to make similar loans but a sufficient amount had been pledged for present needs, therefore no other loans were made. The people were thanked for their attendance and fine response."

On 2 December 1933 the Board borrowed \$3,000.00 and over \$1,500.00 was deposited by the Tax Collector. The Board repaid the \$650.00 personal loans. Then in February 1934 the Board of County Commissioners finally agreed to give the schools all race track funds above \$10,000 but not to exceed \$3,000. Mrs Minnie Deen still operating the cafeteria and reported a net balance of \$2.60 at the end of February. Teachers were instructed that their next pay check will be issued by the local FERA disbursing officer. (?) In April the Secretary reported completing CWA and CWS forms for teachers salaries and forwarded same to the Administration office. (It seems that with the hard times the government is becoming involved in local schools and many committees with many reports are becoming part of the school business) At the end of April Minnie Deen reports the lunch room is still in the black with a balance of \$1.50. The Board approved her report and commended her for her good management.

Beginning December 1933 paid bills were no longer listed in the minutes of the Board meetings, so will not have the cost of future school projects.

Teachers for 1934-35 term were to be Paul E. Peters, Principal, Frances O'Dell, Corinne Van Iderstine and Leo Armstrong. The Board is still keeping close check on the teachers for one teacher was hired with the condition that no dance or card party be given for any school students on any night on which a school day follows, another must promptly finish work for Graduate State Certificate, and another must radically

improve discipline in the room and avoid indiscretions both in and out of school, particularly out of school.

Because of the terrible financial matters the Board Members had not been paid for sometime, and on 16 June 1934 they were paid for the last fourteen meetings. There had been several special meetings involving the tight financial situation in order to keep the schools operating.

In July 1934 the Board bought some school busses but still contracted some routes.

It appeared that some tax money owed the schools was not paid to them and it was reported on 5 December 1934 they brought suit against the former tax collector, C. E. Pellicer and a "disagreeable" settlement was reached.

Another case showing just how bad the financial situation had been, when Minnie Deen submitted her report at the 5 January 1935 meeting of the Board, it showed that her salary had been paid in full for November and December and that \$6.45 had been paid on her back salary.

The new Board was seated on 8 January 1935, composed of G. L. Biddle, K. K. Knight and J. O. Buckles and Z. E. Booe, Secretary.

The minutes did not reveal anything unusual for the school term 1935-36, for even though finances are not as bad as the previous years, there was still not money for much expansion so about only news was the list of teachers and the cafeteria operation to report; the teachers were Paul E. Peters, Principal, Leo Armstrong, Ida F. Stewart, Shirley Caldwell and Homer Biddle named. This was the first year the school offered commerical subjects and Homer Biddle was the instructor. The cafeteria reports had to be more in detail now for it stated that the total receipts were \$177.95, with expenses of \$134.55 for groceries, \$1.00 for glasses, \$40.00 salary leaving \$2.40 balance. The first band was started this year but not much details were included in the minutes for on 7 December 1935 they agreed to pay \$15.00 a month to help with the band and parents were to pay for instruction and to provide the students music. (More on the "Biggest Little Band in Dixie" will be found under chapter entitled Band)

Teachers for the school year 1936-37 were; Paul E. Peters, Principal, Leo H. Armstrong, Hazell Harrell, Ethel L. Oliver Home Economics, and Auten R. Chambers commercial subjects and Louise Prince music for grades I - 12. At the Board meeting of 3 October 1936 they authorized a phone to be installed in the Principal's office, installation to be \$2.50 and \$3.10 per month. However they did not feel as generous with the cafeteria for on 31 October 1936, "Mrs Minnie Deen, manager of Bunnell Cafeteria, had inquired if the cafeteria funds might be used for extra help. The Board recalled that the original arrangement for operating the cafeteria has been maintained all along and found to be satisfactory. That arrangement was that Mrs Deen was to have full charge of the operation, making all purchases of equipment and food supplies and deducting from the profits \$40.00 per month for her services and that any extra profits should be used for necessary equipment for the cafeteria. There is now need for a refrigerator and it was thought advisable to conserve profits for the purchase of a refrigerator at a later date."

On the 5 January 1937 the new Board was seated and the new Superintendent assumed his office; G. L. Biddle, Chairman, Hazen M. Benson and Fitzhugh L. Malphurs, and M. B. Fuller, Superintendent of Public Instruction and Secretary to the Board. Lillian Bilyeu was employed as full time school murse. Upon resignation of Mary F. Jones as Trustee of District Number 2, Mrs Grace S. Lord was appointed. The janitor was employed to work twelve months a year at the salary of \$75.00 per month with a dwelling furnished.

Minutes have now become very lengthy, mostly with the routine work of operating the schools and not much spicy tidbits that would be of interest in this book. Paid bills were entered in vouchers, so it was not possible to pick up interesting information as before. Teachers for the year will no longer be listed. The information now will be mostly the members of the Board and the Superintendent when there has been an election and the School Trustees if they are given will be noted also.

(Note - During M. B. Fuller's term as Superintendent of Public Instruction, I was stenographer-bookkeeper in the office and would delight in occasionally reading the old minute books. Could be that sparked my delving into all this now. As the first full time clerical employee in the Superintendent's office it is hard to comprehend the personnel now required in the administrative office,)

On 7 January 1941 the organizational meeting of the new Board was held with Z. D. Holland Superintendent and Claude S. Deen District No 1 Chairman, George Kendall District No 2 and F. L. Malphurs District No 3, members of the Board. In January 1943, George R. Kendall was elected Chairman of the Board. Then on 30 November 1943, Z. D. Holland was granted a leave of absence during his service in the United States Army. Hazen M. Benson was appointed as acting Superintendent during Z. D. Holland's active military service and George Kendall was still chairman of the Board.

On 2 Jamuary 1945, J. Brady Wadsworth was Superintendent and Board Members were Z. E. Booe District No 1, George R. Kendall District No 2 and Chairman, and F. L. Malphurs District No 3. Brady Wadsworth resigned as Superintendent and Leona W. Eisenbach was appointed to serve until a successor was elected and the minutes of 5 March 1946 were signed by her as Acting Secretary. The minutes of 19 March 1946 were signed by John A Clegg Secretary and George Kendall as Chairman. No reference was found in the minutes of a special election or an appointment of the new Superintendent.

The organizational meeting of 7 January 1947, John A. Clegg was Superintendent with a 2 year commission and members of the Board were T. K. McKnight District No 1 Chairman, George R. Kendall District No 2 and W L Dunson District No 3

By 1950 the Board had been increased to five members with T. K. McKnight Chairman, W. L. Dunson, Harold Bowden, Harold Emery and Malcolm L. Johnson. It was noted during this administration M. L. Johnson served as Chairman also.

At the meeting of 9 June 1952, John A Clegg tendered his resignation as Superintendent effective June 30th and Donnella D. Chastain, Superintendent Elect was appointed to fill the remainder of this term. Board members were the same as in 1950 with M. L. Johnson, Harold Emery, and W. L. Dunson serving as Chairman at one time during this term.

On 6 January 1956 W. L. Dunson was Chairman of the Board with other members being R. F. Tucker, H. C. King, J. H. McKnight Jr and Harold Emery. And at the meeting on 21 August 1956, the Suerintendent, Donnella Chastain tendered her resignation effective as of the 15th, with the Superintendent Elect Z. D. Holland appointed to fill the unexpired term. It seems that a practice of eliminating the 'lame duck' period after the May primary elections if there was to be a new Superintendent in January the current Superintendent would resign and the new Superintendent Elect would be appointed. At that time winning the Democratic nomination in May was assurance of being elected in the general election in November. Others serving as Chairman during this term were Herschel King and Raymon F. Tucker.

The minutes of 6 January 1959 notes Z. D. Holland, Superintendent, with members of the Board; Herschel C. King, Raymon F. Tucker, Walker L. Dunson, Harold Emery and Roy E. Likins. On 7 March 1960 Ria Johnston was been appointed to fill the unexpired term of Herschel King.

The minutes of 3 January 1961 record Z. D. Holland as being reelected as Superintendent for a four year term and hold over Board Members, Harold Emery and Raymon F. Tucker and new two year members Ria Johnston, Walker L. Durson and Roy E. Likins. Roy Likins was named Chairman.

On 8 January 1963 the minutes show Z. D. Holland Superintendent with Members of the Board with four year terms, Herschel C. King District No I, James E. Crews District No 3 and Myrtle C. Rice District No 5 and for two year terms Raymon F. Tucker District No 2 Chairman, and Harold Emery District No 4.

On 5 January 1965 Coy G. Harris was recorded as the Superintendent for the ensuing four years, with the same Board Members as noted in 1963 with Harold Emery as Chairman.

This concludes the abstracting of the minutes of the Board of Public Instruction as this history covers Bunnell High School for the years 1917 to 1967.

## ARTICLE ON AN EARLY BUNNELL SCHOOL By Hobart Barber

This account of an early school in Bunnell that was composed by HOBART BARBER and found by his widow, BERNICE, some years after he died, and covering a period prior to the creation of a high school in Bunnell is included here because of the unusual and very interesting classroom experiences recorded by MR. BARBER. And since the minutes of the Board of Public Instruction of St Johns County did not cover all the transactions concerning the school in Bunnell, this article will supplement the minutes somewhat

Many of the pupils named here will be well remembered today. However it seems MR BARBER did not name all the pupils in the school since you will see from the abstract of the minutes of the St Johns County Board of Public Instruction that the school would have closed when the enrollment fell that low. And since already noted the Board Minutes were a little lax in covering action taken on the school in Bunnell as some teachers named herein were not mentioned in the Board minutes.

Here is HOBART BARBER'S narrative verbatim:

"On or about September the 26th 1905 down in what is now known as 'nigger town' a gentleman by the name of CLIFTON, began teaching the first school the 'Biggest little town in Florida ever had'. His school consisted of FRANK FAULK, VILLA FAULK, DEWEY MOODY and CARL EAGERTON. He taught from the first to the fifth grades.

The old chart that now hangs on the wall of one of the rooms is still dear to many that learned their A B C from it.

During his term MR. MOODY received his first licking with a cypress limb cut from a swamp near by.

Next came MR. TOBY who had the same pupils and during his term MR FAULK and he tied up in the middle of the room for a combat in which FAULK was victorious.

We played ball most every evening before it was time to dismiss. The school closed with out any exercises.

The next year MISS RITTER taught. The pupils of Bunnell could not have gotten a better person for the position. Her school consisted of CARL EAGERTON, DEWEY MOODY, FRANK SILCOX, JETHERO BROOKS, BELL BARBER and myself. DEWEY and JETHRO were the comedians of the school. The school closed with usual exercises.

MISS MINNIE JOHNSTON took charge in the new school building. She was a highly cultured young lady and fit for the position. She only taught the intermediate grades. It was the best school ever had up until this time in Bunnell. The school closed with the first real exercises in the history of Bunnell Schools. There were several recitations and dialogues.

MTSS JARVIS took the school the following year and had about 50 pupils enrolled. The school closed on Friday with a very nice entertainment which was appreciated very much by the town and vacinity.

Then MR BYRD came to Bunnell and taught the school for one term. He taught latin and algebra in the seventh grades. And teaching school was not all he done ether he rapped on several giving lickings while in office. The author received his first licking that year. It was some licking too. If you don't believe me just ask DEWEY MOODY he can tell you he only received eight (8) that year.

All went well for a while but the school was forced to close on account of the principals bad health.

Then came MR BROWN, the lion hearted school teacher. He came with a reputation of whipping seventeen (17) in one day in South Carolina. He taught as high as the 8th grade. One day while MR BROWN was out several of the boys were caught throwing paper balls and upon his return to the room several boys received severe thrashings. Among them was HARRY SIMMONS, DEWEY MOODY, WILLIE BROCK. The school closed with a very good entertainment.

Now MR BUCHANNAN took the local school and he taught from the 5th to the 8th grades. DEWEY MOODY, ALLIE COCHRAN, LOTTIE SMITH and WILLIE BROCK composed the eight grade. WILLIE BROCK was the historian of the class. In one of his great writings he said, "It was a sad and grievous sight to see those poorly clad and half starved soldiers under WASHINGTON'S command cross the Delaware River in 1492". DEWEY MOODY was class comedian, ALLIE COCHRAN, the supposed leader of the class, spent most of her time pasting paper on her face for headache relief.

The class formed what was known as the Macknipona Club, which was composed of the pupils which met every Friday afternoon. The school closed on May the 20th. On May the 18th a play by the name of "Fun in a Photograph Gallery" was given. It was will patronized. On May the 19th the Diplomas were given to DEWEY MOODY, ALLIE COCHRAN, LOTTIE SMITH, who had come up with the requirements of the public school system. The Diplomas were awarded by SUPERINTENDENT CORBETT.

The next year MR BUCHANNAN had the school again. That year the 8th grade composed BAILEY COCHRAN, MYRTLE BROCK, HARRY SIMMONS, CARTER DEEN and LEROY MIRANDA. There were about 80

pupils in school. CARTER DEEN, LEROY MIRANDA and HARRY SIMMONS sat on the row next the isle and many a happy afternoon was spent eating peanuts, and candy, while the back of the teacher was turned. They were happy as the day was long.

All the school term was spent with joy and happy events, everybody getting along nicely. The school closed on the 20th May 1915 with the following exercise play, School in Hickory Hollow, duet by HARRY STMMONS and ALLIE COCHRAN. Numerous recitations and dialogues. On the 19th the diplomas from grammar school was awarded to HARRY STMMONS, CARTER DEEN, MYRTLE BROCK, BAILEY COCHRAN and LEROY MIRANDA. Not a one failing to pass.

On September 27, 1915 MR. J. G. MALPHURS took the Bunnell School. This was known as the second era of good teaching. Everybody, even the old men and women were filled with throngs of joy and happiness for they could for the first time in the history of Bunnell have the privilage of sending to high school.

There were three teachers, MISS CACY, MISS BAKER assistant and MR MALPHURS, professor. MISS CACY taught the primary grades and MISS BAKER the intermediate grades and MR MALPHURS taught from the 8th to the 10th. In the 10th grade was MISS ALLIE COCH-RAN and MISS BLANCHE BRANDERBURG. MISS ALLIE who lives with the expectations of being a suffragette leader. And MISS BLANCHE as the class hostess, whose heart desire is to return to Maryland. In the 9th grade were BAILEY COCHRAN, MYRTLE CROCK, ULA MOODY, HARRY SIMMONS, WILLIE BROCK, CARTER DEEN and DEWEY MOODY. ULA MOODY, who is very easy tickled and MYRTLE BROCK, who sat on the front seat and caught so many times talking on her fingers. She was known as the finger talking artist . . and there is MISS BAILEY COCHRAN, who was the leader of the class, who keeps an awful noise going when she studies. There is DEWEY MOODY the class machanic. When anything goes wrong, MR MOODY consulted at once. And HONORABLE, MR HARRY D. SIMMONS, the class elocutionist, who stands some what six feet and nine ax handles high, took part in so many interesting debates. And MR. WILLIAM PAT-RICK HENRY CLAY BROCK, who turns his face to the wall every time a girl looks at him, is the class historian.

And in the 8th grade were DANIEL MACK, WILLIS MACK, BEAT-RICE SESSIONS, MURTICE RICHARDSON, FRANCES COCHRAN, DEOLIA SMITH, BELLE BARBER, HIRAM CRIE and myself. It causes sadness to rush to the hearts of many to think that MURTICE, WILLIS, FRANCIS, BILL and myself are all that remain out of the largest eight grade the school ever had. Some are in the frozen north, some are still in the sunny south. FRANCES, whose hearts desire is to pull WILLIS MACKS hair before the dawn of another school year. BELLE who sits next WILLIS makes eyes at him the most of her time. And WILLIS, the strawberry blonde is in head over heels in love with FRANCES. And there is MURTICE who works very hard, expects someday to anchor in the heaven of rest. And HOBART, well I guess he will be going to school as long as there is any to go to.

Dear to our hearts is the little room fenced off for the purpose of the high school room, where so many a algebra and arithmetic problem has been explained. And the old fence that runs along the front and the water pipe that stands by it, where many a good drink of water was taken during the hot and sultury days of summer.

And sad is tonight when school mates part companionship and go to there various homes and carry with us happy memories of the pleasant faces here. And teachers we thank you for your kind endeavors to do us good and may your best wishes for us be fulfilled in years to come."

Built in 1909 across from the Methodist Church on the Corner of Lambert Avenue and Church Street. Minnie Mae Johnston taught the term 1909-10, grades 1 through 8.

When the fall term of school opened in 1915 it became BUNNELL HIGH SCHOOL, with the addition of the ninth and tenth grades and a High School Graduation was held the Spring of 1917.

In September 1925 when the first classes were held in the new brick school building, this school was sold to the Methodist Church and it was moved across the street, annexed to the church building and served as Sunday School rooms for many years.

FIRST SCHOOL CAPITERIA

This information to from my personal recollections as my mother. Minute Mac (Johnston) Deen operated the first cafeteria at Bonnell High School, located in the root in the basement that was the lonchroom for exelection bringing their lunch.

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#### BUNNELL HIGH SCHOOL

At the 2 August 1924 meeting of the Flagler County Board of Public Instruction, with all members present it was "moved and seconded that the Board take over new building September first."

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#### FIRST SCHOOL CAFETERIA

This information is from my personal recollections as my mother, Minnie Mae (Johnston) Deen operated the first cafeteria at Bunnell High School, located in the room in the basement that was the lunchroom for students bringing their lunch.

The Palmetto Club of Bunnell bought the stove and other equipment. Although she made a financial report to the Board of Public Instruction each month and was under their supervision as to the operation of the cafeteria, they did not finance it's operation. Her salary, which was \$10.00 per week, had to be paid from the profits of the cafeteria.

Everything was sold for 5 cents each - hamburgers, hotdogs, miscellaneous sandwiches, homemade pies, homemade soup, salads, a hot dish, cold drinks, etc.

The exact date of the opening of the cafeteria is not known but the first reference to a cafeteria found in the minutes of the Board of Public Instruction was in 1931 when, "Mrs Minnie Deen made reports showing balance on hand for September of \$37.79 and October \$45.29, as manager." There are several references to her reports and the Boards action on her requests for improvements in the abstracts of the minutes of the Board Meetings printed in this book.

High school girls worked at noon, for their lunch, helping with the serving and with the cleaning up until the bell would ring for classes to resume. Think it was three worked each day for a week. They would rotate as there was always an ample supple signed up in order to earn their lunch.

Any new equipment had to be paid for from the profits, which were meager, for this was also during that famed "Great Depression". It would really put her in a bind if some school activity took a good many of her regular customers for a day and she was not notified that the crowd would be short.

Her food must have been good for have people ask me even now how she made her hamburgers and did I have her recipe for the cole-slaw she made for the hotdogs.

As the economy improved and the school board assumed the management of the cafeteria, they paid the salary of the employees and the personnal was increased. In 1958 a new brick cafeteria building was erected in back of the main building for the lunchroom department, with a large dining room, a well equipped kitchen, storage room and office and a plate lunch could now be served.

### BASKETBALL

Knowledge of the sports activities of Bunnell High School in it's early years is very scant since have not been able to talk to any students who participated in these events. However some who attended school at the first high school remember the thrill when electric lights were first installed on the basketball court and games could be held at night. The lights were not turned on until time for the first whistle to be blown.

Also at the 'old school house' as the frame building across from the Methodist Church was referred to in later years, the pupils enjoyed playing a game of hockey in the east yard with a stick and a tin can, as one student of that era recalled.

In the fall of 1923 a boys basketball association was organized and each boy's dues were \$1.00 to be used to purchase equipment. The team was coached by C. D. Johnson, principal. The girls selected basketball and hiking as their sports.

After the new school building was occupied in the fall of 1924 a clay basketball court was located in the rear of the building. A few accounts of some of the activities of the teams has been gleaned from some old clippings from the Flagler Tribune.

During the 1927-28 season an account of the "lineup for the girls game with Crescent City was: Allen, Harrell forwards; Palmquist, jumping center; Skowronska, center; Burnsed and Duttenhaver, guards; Ria Allen went in for Skowronska at the end of the third quarter." "The boys lineup included: Walker and Lovelace, forwards; Voss, center; Stanish and C. L. Voss, guards."

March 1928 "The Florida State High School Athletic Association will hold the annual district basketball tournament March second and third. District five, of which Bunnell is a member, will be held at Sanford. The reorganized boys' team of Bunnell High School will complete in the tournament. Some of the other towns in District five are Daytona Beach, Orlando, Deland, Leesburg and Winter Park".

October 1928, "The boys' basketball tean met last Friday in order to elect officers. The following were elected. Kelly McClure manager, and David McKenzie Captain. The boys team this year expects to win a majority of their games. The boys practiced every day last week and showed much improvement Monday, when they had a scrimmage with some of the town boys". "The faculty is organizing a team to practice against the girls on every afternoon beginning Wednesday, October 24. Their line, subject to change, is: Miss Boyd, Miss Wynn, forwards; Miss Holt, Miss Parker, guards; Miss Cochran, jumping center; Miss Clark, running center".

The years of prosperity during the "Big Boom" in Florida were followed by the "Big Bust", then came the "Big Depression", however the basketball teams with the well attended games, continued to be the most popular of the schools' extra curricular activities. The teams would

travel to the out of town games in a school bus with the coaches riding on the bus and keeping order. While I was on the team only the members of the tean and the coaches had the privilage of riding on the bus, except the years Altajane Holden was the 'official cheerleader' and rode the bus with the teams and there was such cheering on the trip for things did not quieten down on the return trip either, win or loose it was a fun trip.

In December 1933, "The Bunnell High School Girls' basketball team played their first game this season in St Augustine, the local squad meeting and defeating the YWCA girls of the Ancient City. The score was 41 - 20, Bunnell's Game. The game was played under the two division court method and was a fast and exciting match throughout, Coach Crosby said. Bunnell also did not make a single substitution during the entire game, although a number of subs were along. The team is being coached by Roy Crosby, who says that the high school team has promise of becoming one of the best in this section. Those playing Friday night were the following: June Brown, Norma Durrance, Grace Robertson, Celia Lord, Betty Wadsworth and Camie Cantrell."

October 11, 1934, "The Athletic association has been organized and officers elected as follows: President, Joy Deen; Vice President, Betty Wadsworth; Treasurer, Gilbert Tucker; Secretary, Audrey Barber; Reporter, Charles Williams. In a contest to see which room will pay their athletic dues first, the senior class has already paid one hundred percent. We have some new diamond balls and bats, also a new football, tennis balls and a dodge ball. The athletic association will sponsor a Hallowe'en carnival to raise funds for playground and athletic equipment. The basketball managers are Audrey Barber for the girls and Gilbert Tucker for the boys. They will be responsible for securing games with other teams. Collected on Athletic dues \$16.19, some of which has been spent for equipment."

October 18, 1934, "Work has started on rebuilding the basketball court. It is also being drained. Lockers and a shower have been installed in the boys' dressing rooms."

17 January 1935, "The Sophomore boys have been building seats around the basketball court this week. The boys basketball team has won four out of five games this season. The girls are showing a great improvement in their playing. The Bunnell boys won with a score of 24 to 14 over the St Joseph's Academy tean, playing their first game on an indoor court. Joy Deen won high honors, Tucker showed up well; also Stanish played a fine defensive game, Jack Hosford's well timed passes were responsible for several goals and Duane Deen's spectacular dribbles made the St Augustine fams sit up and take notice. The girls team held strong against St Joseph, losing 37 to 23. St Joseph has one of the strongest teams in this section. Stars for Bunnell were Virginia Bowers at forward and Betty Wadsworth at guard. Mary Ketus Deen played her first game this season." Other members of the team were W. Trojan, J. Bankston, M. Hankerson, F. Whitaker, F. Rodgers, E. McKenzie, Cantrell and L. Janicki. The girls team did not improve enough for I remember we never won a game all season for I lost a bet to Roscoe Lynn that we would win at least one game, so I had to buy him a coke.

Skipping a few years, the girls team has improved with time and February 1938 "Virginia Bowers was high scorer with 21 points and Marion Hosford was second with 18 points when the Bunnell girls beat Pierson girls. In the boys game Ira Holton and Gilbert Higginbotham won the high points with 12 points each. The Bulldogs beat 39 to 6."

In April 1938, "Bunnell Bulldogs making a trip to Eustis to play in the district tournament were: C. B. Eisenbach, Owen Thomas, Ira Holton, J. B. High, Gilbert Higginbotham, Curtis Deen, John Clements, Cecil Creech, I. I. Moody, Manager and Leo Armstrong, coach."

Flagler Tribune December 1939, "Bunnell boys and girls teams played Crescent City. Boys team members were Zeno Mercer, J. B. High, C. B. Eisenbach, Robert Bertha, Curtis Deen, Cordell Robertson, Ira Holton, Marvin Tucker, Cecil Creech and James Durrance. Members of the girls team were: Virginia Bowers, Evelyn Robertson, Elizabeth Clegg, Marion Hosford, Ruth Clegg, Katherine Walker, Hazel Holton, Sarah Rodgers, Daisy Buckles, Lois Lynch and Peggy Duttenhaver."

In the BULLDOG'S GROWL of 26 January 1945, "The girls lost their game to Crescent City 33 to 17 and the boys lost 33 to 13. Billy Babbit and Lamar Mercer lead in high points in the boys game and Marie Muzyka lead in the girls game."

In another loosing streak, in 1947 the "Bunnell High School girls lost to St Joseph with a score of 28-13. Betty Babbitt had high score for Bunnell and Myra Bowers, Nazhla Trad and Kathryn Hamilton were outstanding guards. The boys team lost 39-20. Cliff Sheffield was point man and William Kelly played an outstanding game."

In 1951 Mr. and Mrs. H. T. Cook gave property adjacent to the school grounds to the Board of Public Instruction and a qymnasium was constructed. Now the old clay court (which was hard surfaced) could be used for Tennis anytime, the tennis players did not have to wait until basketball season was over. The gymnasium was utilized for many school activities in addition to basketball, band concerts, graduation exercises, Junior-Senior Proms as well as other dances, if they were 'Sock Hops'.

"In 1957 the BHS girls basketball team under coach Viola Tonkin, made it through the season with flying colors. The girls team under cocaptains, Barbara Cantrell and Carol Jean Moody won the semi-finals of the St Johns Conference from D & B School. Barbara Cantrell and Jo Ann Morris were elected to the All Conference Team. Other team members were Fern Allen, Penny Barditsky, Melinda DuPont, Celia Joyce Emery, Frankie Lynn, Judy Lewis, Tess Massie, Margaret Ann McCort, Margaret Peavy, Katie Stewart and Irene Morrell."

In April 1958, "Sam Bertha was selected one of the five All-Conference team in basketball. Honorable mention went to Tommy Wells."

Flagler Tribune 28 February 1963, "Mr and Mrs Mike Steflik honored the girls basketball team, Coach Bradley and Eloise McClure, with a dinner at the Pier Restaurant, Flagler Beach. Attending were Jennie Ben-

nett, Susan McMillan, Judy Dunson, Beverly Cummins, Shirley Townsend, Lorraine Wyndham, Heidi Eisenbach, Brenda Tucker, Margie Lee Blakely, Sherry Hargett, Sharon Townsend, Allida Tucker, Mechele Steflik and Barbara Weaver. Silver basketball awards were given by Coach Bradley to Judy Dunson as the most improved player; Allida Tucker and Sharon Townsend for the Best Foul Shot Percentage; and Margie Lee Blakely for attending every practice."

Flagler Tribune 21 March 1963, "Mr and Mrs Alfred Tucker were host for the Varsity and B basketball teams and Mrs Lillian Hersey was hostess to the cheerleaders at the Pierhouse Restaurant at Flagler Beach. Basketball awards were presented to Bebe Moody for the Most Valuable Player and to Robbie Tucker for Best Sportsmanship and to Jim Brown the Free Throw Award. Jim shot 64 percent of his free throws during the year. Quentin Emery was named Captain of the 1963 team. Other guests were Coach Sarita Bradley, Coach Jack Hardin and Coach Cliff McGriff."

December 3, 1964, "Coach Jack Hardin has announced the Varsity players for Bunnell High School Basketball Team, when it opens the season with Florida Military of DeLand, as Walter Twonsend, Elbert Tucker Johnny Seale, Butch Anderson, Martin Tucker, Stanford Robinson, Benton Eisenbach, Jack Knight, Arthur Ford, and Walton Cowart."

2 February 1967, "Three consecutive wins for the Bunnell Bulldogs makes 11 wins and 4 losses for the season and a 7 - 3 conference rating. For the first time in several years the local lads downed the St Augustine High School team for the second time this season 53-46. They also toppled the strong Pierson team 73-58 with Walton Cowart making 34 points. Cowart's point record in this game is the highest since 1965 when Johnny Seale scored 35 points in a game with Callahan."

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#### FOOTBALL

Although I did talk to a member of the first football team at Bunnell High School who related some trials and tributations of getting the 'show on the road', there was not enough facts for a record of that first season in 1938 until John F. Clements gave me some detailed information. So thanks to John F. this is how it all came into being.

After the school term of 1938-39 began in September a drive was instituted to put together a team. However they had a few obstacles to overcome first: They had no football equipment and no money to purchase any; they did not have a coach; they did not have a schedule of games and the season would soon begin. What they did have was a lot of 'drive' and the determination to accomplish the impossible.

Joe Norfleet, the Vocational Agriculture teacher and Professor Houck were their main 'cheering squad' and they came up with the idea of making up some "bonds" on file cards in denominations of \$5.00, \$10.00 and \$25.00, bearing a small rate of interest. These were sold to businessess and interested people to raise \$500.00 to purchase football uniforms and pads.

Joe Norfleet agreed to coach the first year and the candidates for the team began practice. These practices consisted of conditioning, tackling, blocking and learning plays of the old single-winged formation with no pads.

Mr Norfleet, a former University of Florida Football player, made arrangements to get some of their discarded pants and jerseys. However they were about two times too large, but an extra belt and a rope served the purpose.

A schedule was made up with several schools who had an open date, and the first game was to be played at Palatka. On the Palatka team was an outstanding halfback, "Rabbit" Smith, who became an all-american at the University of Georgia and later coached at the University of Florida.

John F. Clements said, "The date of the first game arrived and we had not received uniforms and pads that had been ordered. Although the sporting goods company had promised we would have them in time for the game. Professor Houch called a student body assembly in the auditorium and a teacher had been posted at the railroad station waiting for the renown Number 29 train to arrive. The equipment arrived, and when the news reached the assembly you'd think from the students enthusiam we had won our first football game."

"The team members were excused after lunch for one period to go to the ag shop to try on the football equipment, and I'll never forget the scene. We had never even seen football pads before. Some had them on backwards and it was a riot trying to get it to fit."

"That afternoon Mr Norfleet sent me with his old model "A" truck to Intersession City to get a big sow with 10 pigs, about 60 pounds each, the agriculture department had bought. They were supposed to have been penned up, but instead were running around in a wooded 20 acre field. I got a lot of tackling practice because I had to run down each, tackle, and carry it to the truck. I bet I ran 20 miles in that field, and felt as if I had already played two football games. I got back to Bunnell just in time to park the truck and pigs down town, get on the school bus for Palatka, without anything to eat before the game".

"Since Bunnell High School had never played formal football, we did not know how we'd react under the lights at night. It was a lot different than afternoon practices. Palatka won the game 20 - 7, and this was the first football game in the history of Bunnell High School. I had never thought much about it, but I scored the first touchdown and kicked the first extra point for Bunnell High School. I say this at the sake of being misunderstood".

In the large crowd of enthusiastic Bunnell supporters, Zack Holland, who drove the school bus for this first game, related the following, The first time Bunnell had to punt they were near their own goal line as they had been unable to make any gain when it became necessary to punt. Palatka had no idea Bunnell had a capable punter so their punt receivers were in close. Needless to say their whole team and coach were very surprised when John F. Clements punted the ball about 40 yards over their heads. Thereafter when it was again necessary for Bunnell to punt Palatka showed their respect by placing their punt receivers well back up the field."

That first year the home games were played on the old baseball and softball field behind the school. The second season (1939) the home games were played behind the Civic Center downtown. Florida Power and Light Company erected poles and installed lights with team members working on the ground. Bill Dmytryk of St Augustine Beach was the coach for 1939.

John F. Clements further stated, "Every since 1938 Bunnell High School has fielded representative football teams and developed some outstanding youth. Football has been a major contributing factor in the lives of many Flagler County youth as players, cheerleaders, and in the band. Personally, football provided the only opportunity to attend college on a scholarship, acquire a college degree, play four years of professional ball, and to coach high school teams for 24 years, for which I will be eternally grateful".

Some of the players on that first team in addition to John F. were; Gilbert Higginbotham, Bill Burnsed, Owen Thomas, Harry Thomas, Rim Muray, Hal Murray, Shelton Barber, George Allen, Alfred Tucker and Jim Townsend.

The fact that Bunnell did not take very long to have an outstanding team was apparent for in 1942 Howard Hunter, Brady Wadsworth and Shelton Barber were picked for the All Conference first team at the meeting of the St Johns Conference held at Green Cove Springs. Kenny Townsend and Mack Luten were picked for the second team.

In October 1963, the city Commission of Bunnell selected the name "Bulldog Stadium" for the Bunnell football field and stadium.

In November 1963 the Bunnell Bulldogs beat Callahan 27 - 0 thus winning the St Johns River Conference title. The Bulldogs were the only undefeated team in the conference.

In the years since that first game the art of cheerleading had become more advanced and added greatly to the spectators enjoyment of the game, as well as encouraging the players. In June 1965 according to the Tribune, "The Varsity Cheerleaders of Bunnell High School went to the Gainesville Cheerleaders Clinic June 11-13 in which 50 schools participated. The purpose of the clinic is to improve the techniques of cheerleading. It improves voice, showmanship, cheers and method of cheering. This was Bunnell High's second time to the clinic. Those from the Bunnell High School attended were: Nancy Hargett, Elizabeth Allen, Raybeth Hersey, Emma Jean Lovelace, Sharon Abraham, Lynda Knight, Marilyn McNab, Lynda McNab and Maria Hugas, accompanied by Miss Sarita Bradley and Miss Eloise McClure.





Reverend John Taylor, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Bunnell, was the driving force that resulted in the formation of the Bunnell Band. He started giving lessons in the various instruments to interested students and with the help of several concerned parents, namely Nell Allen, Martha Mercer, Carrie King, Belle and Claude Varn and Sadie Strickland, it eventually became a function of Bunnell High School.

The first mention of the band found in the minutes of the Board of Public Instruction was on 7 December 1935 when they agreed to pay \$15.00 a month to help with the expenses but the parents were to pay for instruction and to provide the students music and instruments.

John J. Heney of St Augustine was the first Band Master and the band room was in the basement. With such an excellent beginning under the instruction of John Heney, who had played with John Phillip Sousa Band, they were destined to do great things. After two years John Heney accepted a position at Stetson University in Deland. The second band director was Bill Heney, brother to John, and under his direction the marching band was begun.

The first account in the minutes of the Board of Public Instruction hiring and paying the salary for a band instructor was the term of 1938-39 when Edward J. Heney, another brother, was named Band Director.

The first band building was a converted bus shed, located on the west edge of the school campus. It was enclosed and a floor added and now the classes in the main building had to study without the daily music.

In March 1939 the band participated in the State Contest in West Palm Beach, making first division in marching, concert, playing and sight reading. Thus the band was eligible to compete in the National Contest in Charlotte, N. C. in May and again proved to be a first division band under the leadership of Edward J. Heney, Band Master.

State Contests were now 'old hat' for this very young band, in 1940 they attended the State Contest in Miami, and in 1941 made the trek to Tampa for the Annual Contest and the Fair. Dan Farmer was the Band Director for the term 1940-41 and Walter Morris became the Director for the 1941-42 term.

The band continued their excellent work but experienced the misfortune of having their director, Walter Morris named Acting Principal in January 1943 when Professor Houck died and this cut into his time with the band. However Walter Morris was drafted into the military service in March of 1943 and Miss Margaret Holland supplied for the remainder of that term. The band was discontinued for the term of 1943-1944 because a director was not available.

Walter Morris was back in 1946-47 and the band continued its great work and somewhere along the line earned the title of "THE BIGGEST LITTLE BAND IN DIXIE". It was a real treat to hear them 'beardown' on DIXIE, you would have your feet tapping and your hands clapping.

After the Gymnasium was built a band building was added to the campus, west of the gym, and now there was room for uniforms, instruments, music and a "repair room" where band mothers periodically met and kept the uniforms held together.

The band continued to participate in State Contests and in January 1957 "Bunnell High School was represented in the Florida All State Senior High Concert in Tampa by Diana McKnight and Jim Cook, both seniors at BHS. The band would entertain the parents and patrons of the school each year with Winter and/or Spring Concerts. When they presented the Winter Concert on March 13, 1958 there were 53 members participating.

The highlight for the band for the school term 1962-63 was the invitation to march in the Annual Cherry Blossom Festival Parade in Washington D. C. on April 6th. After weeks of benefits to raise money for the trip, many days of getting uniforms in as close to Al shape as possible, polishing instruments, etc, the big day finally arrived and at 3:30 A. M. the caraven left from BHS for Palatka where they boarded two Atlantic Coast Line coaches to Richmond, Virginia, where the group changed to buses and arrived at the Hotel Houston in downtown Washington at 1:30 A M on Friday the 15th. On Friday the buses were available for

touring several historical places with a time out for their presentation of a concert on the steps of the Capitol. Saturday was the big day with the parade scheduled for 11 A M and the wind that had blown most of the cherry blossoms off the trees prior to their arrival, had subsided and the sun was shining and it was a perfect day for a parade. The parade lasted three hours with 238 units, seventy eight of which were participating bands, with six from Florida. Sixty Eight band members, bandmaster Walter Morris and 20 adults made the trip. The group left Washington at 7 P M Saturday night and arrived in Palatka on Sunday afternoon.



The Vocational Agriculture Department was added to the high school curriculum the term of 1937-38, with Joe Norfleet as instructor.

A Future Farmers of America Chapter was organized that year and to be eligible to join a student must be enrolled in Vocational Agriculture. The members of this first Future Farmers of America Chapter at Bunnell High School are identified under the picture;

The Vocational Agriculture classes were held in one of the rooms in the basement. The first order of business was to build work tables and set up a shop and classroom. In this class we learned the basics of carpentry - how to properly use all the tools - how to sharpen and care for them.

We also learned about producing vegetables and basic farming - seeds, fertilizers, pesticides, fungicides, planting, harvesting, packaging and marketing crops. We had a demonstration plot at a farm in Black Point and grew a variety of vegetables for sale.

The purpose of Future Farmers of America was to build character, learn public speaking, parlimentary procedure, career planning and many things of this nature.

The two were integral and we made many field trips to the University of Florida for animal judging - to slaughter houses - to fertilizer plants - to experiment stations to forestry stations - to state and county fairs,

However the climax of all trips was to New York City in 1939 to the World's Fair. Joe Norfleet and I drove a school bus for the trip with stops in Philadelphia and Washington D C on the return trip.

We frequently met with other chapters from neighboring schools for an afternoon of games and a cookout.

We attended short courses on various subjects at the University of Florida and P. K. Yonge in Gainesville.

This was a fun class but very instructive. I am sure that later in life many a wife appreciated her husband being able to fix so many things around the house and being knowledgable about gardening and flowers.

From some clippings of the Flagler Tribune and some student scrapbooks the following bits of information have been found regarding the F F A Chapter at BHS.

In February 1938, "The Bunnell FFA Chapter Fruit and Vegetable Judging Team composed of Frank Steflik, Harry Thomas and Victor Cyzycki placed third in the state contest in judging."

In the program for the FFA Annual Father/Son Banquet, 11 December 1941, the following officers were named: President, Brady Wadsworth; Vice President, Harry Thomas; Secretary, George Clegg; Treasurer, Waldon Durrance; Reporter, Alfred Tucker; Watch Dog, Mack Luten; Advisor, Joe Norfleet. Members listed were; Howard Bankston, James Crews, Robert Dunson, Thomas Gresham, Jim Henderson, Wilfred Hunter, Danny Johnston, Florian Novak, Lloyd Robertson, Mike Trad, Peter Trad, Eugene Bowers, Leslie Tucker and Harold McAlexander.

An F F A Dinner Program contained the following: Prayer, Rev. Kelly McClure; Welcome, George Clegg; Response, Mrs Harry Clegg; Music, Herschel King; 1942-43 Chapter Accomplishments, Leonard Moody; Music, Larry King; Address, Dr A. L. Shealy.

Harold McAlexander, a 1944 graduate, had been a member of F F A for five years.

In 1957, "Phillis Hosford was elected the Future Farmer Chapter Sweetheart at the annual parent-son banquet. Harry Stuckey and Charles Trad received Star Farmer trophies. Billy Deen received the public speaking award and James Kendall received the Farm Mechanics award. The awards were presented by Z. D. Holland, Superintendent."

In May 1957, "Billy Deen, son of Mr and Mrs W. W. Deen of Bunnell won first place in the district public speaking contest of the FFA held in Santa Fe last Thursday."

"The FFA Banquet was held Friday, March 22, 1963 and Ida Allen was presented as the 1963 FFA Sweetheart."

So it seems that the FFA Chapter at Bunnell High School continued to be an active organization with interested members and good workers.

## CIVILIAN CONSERVATION CORPS

For those of you who did not experience the 'Great Depression' and did not know of the C C C Camps, this brief sketch is included that you might better understand why some youth interrupted their education for a short time to participate in this program.

That bleak period in the United States History known as the 'Great Depression' prompted President F. D. Roosevelt to make good on his campaign promise of a 'New Deal' and he called an emergency session of Congress and during his first 100 days in office, the new administration produced a big potful of "alphabet soup' legislation that was quickly dished out to the public. Across the land, the federal programs soon became known by their initials.

On 31 March 1933, the CIVILIAN CONSERVATION CORPS became law. This new legislation provided jobs for jobless, single male citizens, ages 18-25 and economic relief for the families at home and at the same time to preserve the nation's resources through conservation. Some boys were known to give their age falsely as they were anxious to have this new experience, thus they left school to join before the age of 18.

Veterans of World War I were employed to administer the camps, set up to help protect, develop and perpetuate existing national forests, and to build state parks and dams, thus reclaiming the United States' deteriorating national resources. Perhaps the greatest natural resource saved was many of the nations youth. Many boys gained weight, self-pride and new direction for their lives.

The boys were paid \$30.00 a month. They were allowed to keep five to seven dollars and the balance was sent to the family member of their choice at home. They served for six months. During the corp's nine year existence some four million boys passed through the corp.

Some of the boys who left school and joined the C C C upon returning home, enrolled in school and completed their high school education.



This was the first school term under the Flagler County School Board after the county was created in July 1917.

Since it has not been possible to construct a 10th grade graduating class for 1919 the following articles from the Flagler Tribune pertaining to school activities are given;

Flagler Tribune, 8 May 1919, "BUNNELL SCHOOL CLOSED, Friday afternoon last saw the closing of the Bunnell Public School for the year. It had been decided that no special exercises would be rendered by the school, but a short program was neverless prepared and rendered by the pupils. It was felt by Professor Ramsey and his assistant that the progress made during the term was so badly handicapped that any effort at closing exercies would be more or less unsuccessful . . . . the entertainment was very fine indeed. PROFESSOR RAMSEY presiding after two songs, readings by FRANCES COCHRAN, MARION KING, OLA BARBER, BERNICE BATES, GEORGE WICKLINE and ALIE COCHRAN. MISS OLA BARBER was awarded five dollars in gold for her excellent work, she having made a general average of 95 on all her studies during the term."

"The following scholars graduated from ninth and will enter the tenth grade next session; MARION KING, EULA MOODY, VICTOR MCKENZIE, FRANCES COCHRAN and OLA BARBER."

One of the drawbacks of the Bunnell School as reported by the Principal and his assistant was the fact that the men of Bunnell seemed to take little or no interest in the school and that during the season just closed not a man resident of the town had seen fit to visit the school during the term. They asked that next year's instructors be given this courtesy.

Though not news of this class, of possible interest was an announcement in the Flagler Tribune, 1 May 1919 that a teachers examination was given in Bunnell by the State and those from Bunnell taking the examination were, MRS NELLIE KING, MISS FLORENCE FRANCOIS, MRS CORA G. HAYES, MISS JESSIE MALPHURS, MRS RUTH RICHARDSON AND MISS PAULINE HENDERSON from Espanola.

It was not determined the names of other teachers at the Bunnell School, other than the Principal and the Assistant Principal, but a list of teachers for the term 1918-19 can be found in the Abstract of the Board of Public Instruction meetings where the payroll for all the teachers in Flagler County is given.

He spoke of the many drawbacks of last year and hoped that no such ill luck would interrupt the work during the present year. New Truant Officer Mr L. A. Jett introduced."

Flagler Tribune, 17 July 1919 - NEW ADDITION TO SCHOOL HOUSE WILL BE STARTED MONDAY "The L. A. Jett Company will begin the erection of a new addition to Bunnell Public School Building Monday morning. The addition to be built will be two class rooms of 15 X 24 feet each, with a 6 foot hallway connecting them with the present structure. In addition the company is to erect a 24 foot vanishing petition in the main hall of the present building, other improvements, the correction of the foundation of the old building, as well as putting necessary out buildings and sanitary equipment that has been needed since the house was erected."

"The school house in Bunnell has been decidedly inadequate for the past several years. It was mere make-shift when it was the property of St Johns County. The County has had in mind the erection of the proper buildings when it was fully able to do so."

"The graduation class, consisting of Mr Jack Smoak, Miss Donnella Deen, Miss Ruth Biddle, Miss Pearl Parker and Miss Ida Allen, drew a full house on Friday evening and their papers, each being painstakingly prepared and well rendered, brought resounding applause and happy appreciation to all hearers.

The exercises of the evening were opened by our much beloved and splendid old gentleman, Judge W. Lee Bartlett, who offered prayer, asking the blessings of God upon the new fledged young men and women just entering the threshold of life.

Following the class papers Prof. G. W. Lee made a most excellent talk to his graduating class - a farewell that was fraught with the best of advise and kindly wishes for their success in life. This lecture was one of the kind that will help to make better men and women of all who had the pleasure of hearing it.

Dr. D. B. Brown, Superintendent of Schools was called upon for an address and responded in a happy vein. The evening closed by the presentation of diplomas by Dr. Brown and benediction by Judge Bartlett.

Each of the graduating class received numerous and appropriate presents upon this happy mile in their lives, and the patrons of Bunnell High departed, thankful for the achievements of their sons and daughters and full of gratitude to the teachers and to the good man who has had guidance over young America during the past two school years - Professor G. W. Lee."

It seems that high school students were used as substitutes when needed as in May 1922 Donnella Deen was paid \$18.75 as a substitute teacher.

"Opening the program with a hymn by the scholars and visitors the graduating exercises of the Bunnell High School, held in the Methodist Church through the kindness of Pastor Partridge, Friday evening last, held the interest of one of the largest audiences ever congregated in that edifice and proved to be one of the most interesting and entertaining of its kind."

"It is needless to say that each of the graduates acquitted themselves handsomely. The hearers fain would have applauded each to the limit only that there seemed to be an understanding that such should not be in accord with the rules of the house of God."

"Dr Enwall was somewhat restrained by the limit of time given him for his address but he made a most profound impression on his hearers, both young and old. At times he grew eloquent in his pleading for a higher and better citizenship and for a God-loving and God-fearing people in Flagler County. He impressed it upon the Mothers and Fathers that their duty to their children demanded a christian home and precept and example to guard against, wrong in the lives of their offspring. To the graduating class he spoke of their duties to come and that to make their lives worth the while there were three sentences he wanted to impress upon their minds: 'I ought', 'I must', and 'I will'. and his delineation of these three sentences proved to be an earnest sermon that reached the hearts of all his hearers. Dr Enwall was introduced by Professor Fender."

This was the first class to graduate from a four year program at BUNNELL HIGH SCHOOL. Not having access to a graduation program nor a newspaper account of the graduation, the only information given by one of the graduates, was "the graduation exercises were held in the Methodist Church across the street from the school".

The following excerpt from the Flagler Tribune of 30 August 1923 could be of interest as it reports the time a four year high school program was assured; "Senior High School assured for Bunnell. The visit of Prof. Seeley from the State Superintendent's office at Tallahassee Saturday last resulted in the recommendation that Bunnell be granted full rights as a senior high school, and arrangements for the extra grade has been perfected through the renting of the spare room in the (Methodist) church building which will be immediately altered to conform to the needs of the school". It was reported in the Tribune on 6 September 1923 that school had opened on Monday with 200 pupils enrolled. Other than Professor Johnson other high school teachers were Virginia Tiller and Clara Herlong. The elementary teachers were, Frances Cochran, Etta Scarborough, Ola Barber, Bessie Allen, Allie Cochran and Nannie Watson.

An article from the Flagler Tribune of 28 February 1924 concerning the high school student body is interesting, "B. H. S. TO GIVE BOOK SHOWER AT M. E. CHURCH MAR 6th. Due to the especial interest manifested throughout the high school student body over plans for an enlarged school library, they have planned a book shower for Bunnell School, to be held Thursday night, March 6th at the M. E. Church. There will be a program of readings, songs, music and a splendid comedy dialogue, all prepared and given by high school students. All friends of the school including patrons, pupils and others, are invited, and the only admission to be charged will be that each person passing through the door will present a book to the school. The high school pupils will have on hand a course of delicious refreshments for each and every guest who attends."

An announcement of the graduation was carried in the Flagler Tribune on 22 April 1926. Graduation April 26, 1926. "The following are the graduates who will receive Diplomas;

On Friday evening of this week, a grade program will be rendered by the lower grades. The exercises on Monday evening will close this term of school, which has been very successful, and all the teachers are to be commended for their untiring efforts in behalf of the students of Bunnell High School, and that they have been successful is shown by the rapid advancement into higher grades by the pupils".

Though not a school function the announcement in the Flagler Tribune, 4 March 1926 of the Chautauqua to be held in the High School Auditorium, could be of interest;

"On the second day of the Radcliffe Chautauqua will be found one of the most entertaining and unique attractions of the entire series. Miss Charlotte Chamberlain, nationally known entertainer will appear in the dual capacity of cartoonist and bird-warbler, sharing both hours with the Kellams. She is one of the leading woman cartoonists to be found in this country. Her entertainments are full of action, for she draws with lightning-like rapidity and pictures before you old familiar scenes, prominent characters, themes from well known literary and musical compositions; and between them are heard the songs of our beautiful American birds. Miss Chamberlain is also an accomplished pianist."

From the Flagler Tribune - "Closing of Bunnell Schools for the 1927-28 term came to an end Monday Evening when Dr. Joseph Roemer delivered the graduating address to an overflowing auditorium of parents and school patrons."

"Sunday evening preceding Dr. Ludd M. Spivey, President of Southern College at Lakeland, delivered the Baccalaureate address to equally as large a crowd. His address drew many favorable comments from those who were present to hear him. One senior, Sumner Allen was absent, he having been injured in an auto accident two days previous while the class were in route to picnic at DeLeon Springs".

"The grades held their exercises on Friday evening but were awarded their certificates Monday evening immediately after diplomas were awarded the graduating Seniors. Dr. Roemer made the presentation of diplomas and certificates. This has been one of the most successful school years in the history of the County School system."

The Home Economics Department was added to the high school curriculum for the 1927-28 term.

Listed on the honor roll for February 1928 were Myrtle Harding, Helen Trojanowski and Winona Teston. On the honor roll for March were Hazel Harrell, Myrtle Harding and Helen Trojanowski.

In the class history given by Helen Trojanowski were found the following comments: "In looking back over our four years in Bunnell High School, we began in the new building which had just been completed. Then with twenty in number but by 1925 many had moved away and our number had dimished to ten and then increased to fourteen but this our Senior year from the old class of twenty beginners, Winona Teston, Myrtle Harding, Sumner Allen and myself were all that remained but with an addition of new members Hazel Harrell and Lula Raiford. The class has done many things of note this year. In April we had Senior Day and in May the Juniors entertained us with a Banquet which was highly appreciated. The class play was a marked success. With graduation our High School life ends and we will no longer be associated together as classmates and we feel as each of us go on lifes highway that we have profited by the association with the 1928 class and faculty and are better equipped to meet life's problems."

Flagler Tribune, 22 March 1928 - under SCHOOL ACTIVITIES "Part of the science class and several other students made a trip to Daytona Beach last Saturday to visit the Florida Power & Light Company's ice plant. Mr Messmore, the chief engineer, took the class through the ice plant, explaining every part of the ice making. The students had packed lunches and made the trip on the Korona School Bus".

"The Reverends Clark, Marshall and Hartsfield conducted chapel exercises Thursday last. Rev. Clark entertained the school body by telling a very interesting story which especially amused the lower grades. Rev. Marshall played his Italian accordion as he sang. The program was greatly appreciated by all".

"A pair of scales was purchased by the school in order that everyone may be weighed regularly. Also fifty new books were purchased, twenty five for the grades and twenty five for the high school library. The books and the scales were bought with some of the money from the door receipts of the play which was recently staged in the school auditorium." The Seniors of 1928 were the first Senior Class to be entertained with a Banquet and Prom. The Junior Class of 1928 inaugurated this custom that has since been an annual event. This first Banquet and Prom was held upstairs in the Bunnell State Bank Building. At one time the upstairs of this concrete block building at the corner of Moody Boulevard and Railroad Street housed the Flagler County Courthouse and the large room used for the court room was also used for community entertainments. Accoring to the Flagler Tribune of 26 April 1928, "The Junior-Senior Banquet will be held next Tuesday night at eight o'clock in the Civitan Club's rooms. Immediately following the dinner the Junior Prom will be held in the same room".

According to an article in the Flagler Tribune of December 1927 the students of Bunnell High School were busy that fall with various clubs; "Bunnell High School elected the following newspaper staff members: Managing editor, Sumner Allen; associate editor, Homer Biddle; sports editor, Harold Haley; Social editor, Hazel Harrell; Joke editor, Dave McKenzie." "The students Activities Club at Bunnell High School elected the following officers: Shep Cochran, president; Susie Burnsed, vice president; Thealkabell Cain, secretary."

This class, who had inaugurated the custom of the Junior class entertaining the Seniors, were now the recipients of an elegant evening when the annual Banquet and Prom was given by the Junior Class on the 9th May at the Flagler Beach Hotel, in their honor, and according to the Flagler Tribune it was a brilliant affair; "The Annual Junior-Senior Banquet and Prom of Bunnell High School was held last Thursday evening in the Flagler Beach Hotel in that town. W. J. Hamrick, sponsor for the Senior Class acted as toastmaster at the Banquet and brief addresses by L. S. Cody, president of the Junior Class; Harold Haley, president of the Senior Class; G. H. Pinholster, Principal; and Z. E. Booe, Superintendent of Public Instruction were features of the program. A toast to the seniors was given by Miss Marguerite Smith and Miss Louise Allen responded with a toast to the juniors. The dinner hour ended at 9:30 o'clock and dancing was enjoyed until a late hour. Members of the junior class who sponsored the banquet and prom are: Ria Allen, Marable Bielling, Mary Elizabeth Browning, Pearl Forsyth, Marguerite Smith, Lewis Ambrose, L. S. Cody Jr, William Stanish and Lee Walker."

This Senior Class is the largest in the history of the school, numbering fifteen. Previously the largest graduating class numbered six.

High school teachers other than Mr G. D. Pinholster, principal were Mrs. E. M. Parrott, Mrs. Clark DeLoach, Mr William J. Hamrick, Mr C. H. Hudson and Mrs. Mary F. Jones.

Some pre-graduation activities included; Louise Allen entertained the class with a theater party on May 13th - the class climbed aboard a truck and road to Daytona Beach to see "Broadway Melody"; A Fan Tan Party was given by Mrs Mary Jones and Mrs Etha McKenzie on May 16th; The Bill Hamricks gave a "Backwards Party" on May 17th - you wore your clothes backwards - went in the back door then out the front door - dessert first then main course - even walked backwards to be seated; A class picnic was held on the 22rd; then on May 27th the faculty gave the class an ice cream party at Holdens' Drug Store after graduation with radio music!

In the Flagler Tribune, January 17, 1929 under BUNNELL SCHOOL CHAT, the following items are of interest; "A mulberry velour curtain of exceptionally good quality has been purchased from the Atlanta Scenic Company. It has been installed and everyone is pleased with it." "The Bunnell school has at present the highest enrollment in the history of the school, numbering 325 pupils. 257 being in the elementary grades and 63 in high school. The highest previous enrollment was 311 pupils and that was during the third month of last years's term."

When the class of 1929 held the celebration of the 50th anniversary of their graduation on the 16 May 1979 an article in the Flagler Tribune carried many interesting remarks by some attending; "Those were days when it was a real treat to go to Daytona Beach and dance to the big name orchestras at the Daytona Beach Pier. Of course you had to behave and beware of 'necking' on the pier for there was a policeman by the name of John LaTour, who was there to remind you there would be no offensive sights on Lovely Daytona Beach".

"Those were the days when you came home from school you did your household chores".

"There were lots of stage plays in those days. Directors would come from other places, stay in Bunnell for a couple of weeks, direct a production using school students and after the town was entertained they would get a percentage of the proceeds and move on. They always had a chorus line and the girls especially had a good time in ornate costumes with all the bally hoo and glitter of the era".

"On Sundays, the group would make a churn of ice cream, have a marshmellow or weiner roast, sometimes at individual homes or on the beach."

"They did a lot of double dating back in 1929. Not everyone had a car and besides it was just more economical that way. It was a very good outing on Sunday if the group got together and made the loop from Bunnell, around Mound Grove and back to the Flagler Beach area. The old Coast Guard area was evacuated at that time and many of the group used to climb the old Coast Guard Tower and view the surrounding sites".

"Then came the parties at the Flagler Beach Casino. Oh boy, if you stayed too late and the street lights were out (they went off at midnight) you knew you were going to catch it because all youngsters were supposed to be in by midnight and any later was a no no".

This affair, the most important social event sponsored by the school, was originally scheduled to occur April 17,00but the date was recently changed because two of the upper classmen will be away on the RUTH BRYAN OWENS trip to Washington on that date, they being Ralph Harbert and Marguerite Smith, who are representing the high school during this trip. For the banquet the lobby and dining room of the hotel were decorated in the school colors, green and white. Corydon Carter, a member of the Junior Class, acted as toastmaster. Mary Elizabeth Browning, President of the Junior Class, welcomed the seniors and other invited guests, and L. S. Cody, Jr, President of the Senior Class, responded. A short talk was made by G. D. Pinholster, Principal of the school,

after which Corydon Carter gave a toast to the seniors, and William Stanish responded with a toast to the juniors. After the dinner hour the guests retired to the main lobby where they enjoyed music and dancing until a late hour."

In the Flagler Tribune of 6 November 1930 the following article, "LOCAL BOY WINS ESSAY PRIZE ON WASHINGTON TRIP, Ralph Harbert, Winner, Is Student of Bunnell High School - Double honors have been bestowed upon Ralph Harbert, student in Bunnell High School this year, he being selected by the student body here to go to Washington last April with the representatives of 18 other high schools of the Fourth Congressional District as guest of Mrs. Ruth Bryan Owen. The Florida Press Association offered a silver loving cup to the high school student who wrote the best essay on the trip, and this week Ralph received a personal letter from Mrs. Owen stating that he was winner of the first prize offered by the press association."

Mrs. Owen's letter to Ralph follows;

"Congress of the United States, House of Representatives, Washington, D. C. October 31, 1930.

Dear Ralph:

I have just received word that the judges have awarded your story first prize in the Florida Press Association contest and I am writing to express my heartiest congratulations. It is especially fine to have won first place when the standard of all the essays was so high. The judges commented on all the really excellent papers which they reviewed. You will hear from Walter Buckingham soon and in due time receive the prize awarded by the press association. I fell sure that your family and your community will feel very proud of this honor you have won. With congratulations and best wishes.

Sincerely yours, RUTH BRYAN OWEN"

Of interest is the notation that of the 18 schools represented only one other is as small a school as Bunnell.

Tribune 25 December 1930, "Tallahassee, Florida, December 18, 1930, Mr G. D. Pinholster, Principal, Bunnell, Florida; I have the pleasure of informing you officially that Bunnell High School has been accredited by the State Board of Education as a four year Senior High School for the year 1930-31. Sincerely yours, M. R. Hinson, State Supervisor of high schools."

#### "BEST YOUNG CITIZENS"

During Ruth Bryan Owen's term as Congressman of the Fourth Congressional District of Florida, she sponsored, as a part of a campaign pledge to educate boys and girls to be intelligent voters,, an annual "Patriotic Pilgrimage" of Florida's "Best Young Citizens" from the district she represented. It consisted of one boy and one girl, selected as the most public spirited by their high school fellows, from each the eighteen counties in District Four. The first pilgrimage was made in the spring of 1930 and the students chosen from Bunnell High School were Marguerite Smith and Ralph Harbert. Names of the students selected for the Pilgrimage in 1931 is not known. The two students chosen for this honor in the spring of 1932 were Juanita Ethel DeVette and William Welch Deen. From Jacksonville, Florida and Washington D. C. newspaper accounts of the trip made in April 1932 the following condensed data will give some knowledge of the value obtained from these Pilgrimages.

The group started boarding the Miamian of the Florida East Coast railway in south Florida and gained in number until it numbered about two score on arrival in Jacksonville where they left aboard a special chartered Pullman car attached to the Southern States Special of the Seaboard Air Line railway. During their three day stay in the Capital, Mrs. Owen, as their guide had a full program planned for them which included dinner with her the night of arrival, hearing her give an address on Citizenship in the House caucus room, seeing Washington's famous cherry blossoms, visiting the Washington Monument and Lincoln Memorial, the Pan-American building and Congress in session.

General John J. Pershing told the young Floridians "all who have the best interests of the country at heart look to you the coming generation, to carry on". He gave the young citizens that advise as he described to them the historic treasures in the State, War and Navy Building which houses his office as chairman of the National Monuments Commission.

During their stay in Washington, the Floridians saw the governmental departments in action, visited President Hoover at the White House, and heard speeches by Vice President Curtis and his sister, Mrs Dolly Gann, Speaker Garner of the House of Representatives, Mrs. Owen and Fannie Hurst and Cora Harris, the novelists.

A reunion with students from previous Pilgrimages was to be held in St Augustine and the students making the trip this year, 37 in number, in charge of their chaperones, and with Congressman Owen in the party, arrived at the Florida East Coast Railway station at 10:30 A. M. There was a big delegation at the station to meet the party. The St Augustine School Band played and there was a gift of flowers for Congressman Owen. A motorcade was formed and a parade through the city to Ketterlinus High School where the program included welcomes by the county superintendent of schools, the mayor. Dr. John J. Tigert, president of the University of Florida, spoke with enthusiasm of Congressman Owen's patriotic work as exemplified through the annual pilgrimages. After luncheon served at Flagler Memorial Church House and a brief afternoon session and a sightseeing trip of St Augustine, the young folks of this and other years, either left with family members who came to St. Augustine to meet them or boarded the night train for points south.

According to honor roll listings in the Flagler Tribune during the 1927-28 term several members of this class, then in the 6th grade, were consistently named for the honor roll, namely; Camie Cantrell, Norma Durrance, Clarence Gordon, Sophie Mlotowski and Emery Yelvington.

During their Junior year this class sponsored a play, "OH PRO-FESSOR!", copy of the program follows. Not only will it be interesting to note the cast in the play but the advertisements from the local merchants and citizens will be of interest.

The Junior Class entertained this Senior Class with a Banquet and Prom at 415 Peninsula Drive Daytona Beach, Florida. The Club was beautifully decorated with the class colors of pink and blue with green accents, dinner was by candlelight, place cards, nut cups and party favors also carried out the color scheme. The dance hall was decorated with gladioli and other spring flowers. During the dancing hours punch was served from a lace covered table and horns and other noisemakers added merriment to the party. According to the account of the affair in the Daytona Beach paper, "The dance opened with a grand march which resembled a fashion revue. The gowns worn by the girls were smart and colorful". This was the first and probably the only banquet and prom for the senior classes of Bunnell High School to be held out of the county, as the idea was not so popular with the citizens of the county.

Those of you who were residents of the area at that time will recall how Bunnell would be flooded during a downpour and an unusual happening occured during such a flood on the night of graduation for this class. A torrential rain started in Bunnell in the afternoon of June 1st and the scheduled speaker, Hon Charles Durrence of Jacksonville, and his wife were to have dinner at the Halcyon Hotel, however on arriving and finding the grounds to the hotel flooded, he rolled up his trousers and carried his wife into the hotel for dinner. The rains had not subsided when the hour approached for the Commencement Exercises and one of the graduates, Camie Cantrell, become drenched getting into the school building and if you remember some synthetic materials of that day would draw up considerable when wet and that is what happened to Camie's dress. She was to give the Salutatory address and she was devastated to think of going on the stage as she looked. The Junior class girls being in the chorus and also wearing white dresses, just happened to contain one member of the approximate same size, so Betty Wadsworth changed dresses with Camie and the graduation went off smoothly then.

This was the first class to wear caps and gowns for graduation exercises at Bunnell High School.

It was also the first Junior class to entertain the Senior class out of the county for the annual Banquet and Prom. Classes in the future heard about it when they sponsored money making projects.

Do not know when the custom of the senior class presenting a gift to the school was first instituted but the class of 1935's gift to the school was either planting a hedge across the front edge of the school grounds or reconditioning and extending an existing hedge.

In the Tribune during the term 1927-28 listing the students on the monthly honor rolls in the fifth grade the following students were consistently on the honor roll; Pearl Barlett, Mary Ketus Deen, Teddy Cyzycki, Nettie Gorys, Vera Holton, Katie Novak and Muriel Walker.

The Junior Class entertained this Senior Class with a Banquet and Prom held at the Flagler Beach Hotel on the 29th March 1935. The Junior Class Officers were: President, Joy Deen; Vice President, Zachary G. Holland Jr; Secretary, Wanda Trojan and Treasurer, Johnny Stanish. The theme was an 'Old Fashioned Garden of Rainbow Land'. The Junior Class girls had gowns fashioned alike from their favorite rainbow color. Joy Deen, President of the Junior Class gave the welcome at the Banquet which was responded to by Betty Wadsworth, President of the Senior Class. Each Senior was given a favor of a small money bag made of gold cloth containing 25 uncirculated pennies. Attendants in the garden were; Jeannette Bankston, Fannie Buckles, Evelyn Burnsed, Freda Montgomery and Florence Whitaker.

Other entertainments given in honor of this senior class were: Mr and Mrs V. W. McKenzie honored Marjorie McKenzie and the entire class with a formal dinner party; A weekend house party at the Flagler Beach home of Mrs. L. E. Wadsworth, with Dudley Benson hosting a dance at the Flagler Beach Hotel on Saturday night; The Home Economics Class gave a Scavenger Hunt and Lawn Party honoring the senior class at the home of Mr and Mrs S. H. Cameron.

An interesting coincidence concerning the boys in this class, was all four boys attended the University of Florida at Gainesville and when they all graduated in 1939 the commencement address was given by Dr. W. S. Allen, President of Stetson University at Deland. The same Dr. Allen who delivered the commencement address for this high school class. Of the six girls who graduated one attended Florida State College for Women at Tallahassee and three attended Business Colleges in Jacksonville and Orlando.

### REMEMBER FLAGLER IN 1935?

The following article was prepared for the fortieth reunion of the class of 1935, held on Saturday, April 26, 1975. The author is Jim Camp, a friend and a member of the class of 1936 of Bunnell High School.

1935! The Chicago World's Fair was over, and so was the Great Depression (as far as Flagler County was concerned) although northern breadlines and street-corner apple peddlers were still in the news.

Here at home we could "go to the show" at the Empire in Daytona afterwards enjoy a hot dog - with lots of homemade slaw - for a nickel at Clarice Teston's Coney Island Inn. Sometimes the really "big spenders" would order a barbecue (and that was the real thing too, not out of a can) but that cost 15¢.

Saturday nights were special! The stores stayed open late, and everybody went up town and parked (diagonally) on Moody Boulvard or U. S. l. Sure, it was the main highway between New York and Miami, but the traffic wasn't all that heavy.

We bought groceries, and shopped for clothes, at "The Mercantile" owned by the McKenzies, and across the street Hugh Cameron's meat market would throw in a bag of "scraps" for free, for the family dog. Cokes were five cents at Holden's Pharmacy, which was "open after the show" (a slogan thought up by Pharmacist Bob Jones) on the nights of class plays at Bunnell High School auditorium.

Also, this was the year of the "talkies" when the Rufus Robbins family came up from Titusville and re-opened the old Biddle Theatre with Will Rogers in "David Harum". Built in the days of the silents, the building had awful accoustics - a problem that was partially solved by hanging moss on the walls!

There was no airconditioning, but it was cooler after dark, when the side windows could be opened! So it wasn't Radio City Music Hall, but the movies were the same, and this was the "Golden Age" of Hollywood. Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers, Jeanette MacDonald and Nelson Eddy, Dick Powell and Ruby Keeler, Paul Whiteman's "King of Jazz" with songs by the Rhythm Boys, one of whom was a crooner named Bing Crosby.

When we weren't going to the show, or swimming at Neoga Lake, we worked jig-saw puzzles, loaded up our Model A Fords, and "necked" in the rumble-seats. 3.2 beer was back, but the end of Prohibition didn't mean anthing to the high school crowd, back in those lazy innocent days when only the "fast" college crowd and sometimes our parents (on the sly) went to the infamous Chateau Lido in Daytona.

The "big" social event of the year was always the Junior-Senior Prom at the Flagler Beach Hotel. When the 11th Grade entertained the Class of '35, the theme was an "old-fashioned rainbow garden" and during dinner someone sang Shirley Temple's "On the Good Ship Lollipop"! So much for the floor show.

Forty years ago!

"The Beach" was a sleepy little town where no motel had dared to compete with the hotel. They called 'em "tourist camps" in those days,

anyway. Aside from the ocean, and the pier, Holden's drug store and the sulphur-watered swimming pool on Central Avenue were the main (and only) attractions.

In Bunnell, Rodgers' Lunch Room was open all night, with 50 cent steak dinners, and the best Brunswick Stew you ever tasted. Our town was becoming more sophisticated, with movies and live plays, by the Burgham Players from Daytona. The yearly carnival, with merry-go-round, ferris wheel, and games of chance, no longer pitched its tents on the vacant lot behind the Bunnell State Bank Building.

There hadn't been a "medicine show" in town in years, and our younger brothers and sisters had never heard of "Silas Green from New Orleans"! The Chatauqua had even quit coming to the school auditorium. We were between World Wars, and although there wasn't much excitement, Bunnell was a nice place to live. It would soon change, along with the rest of the world, but 1935 was a "wonderful year."

There was no gym on the school grounds. Basketball was played outdoors, under makeshift lights at night, and the first Bulldog football team was still in the future. John Heney, a former soloist with John Phillip Sousa's Band, had started the Bunnell High School Band, soon to be known as "the biggest little band in Dixie."

In the markets, sirloin steak was 29 cents a pound, bacon 22 cents, pork chops 20 cents, milk 10 cents a quart, bread 5 cents a loaf, and sugar 5 cents a pound!

Abroad, things were not so happy. Mussolini invaded Ethiopia. In Nuremberg, the Nazi Party showed off its military might with 100,000 men, heavy tanks, artillery and 100 warplanes. Persia became Iran, and Moscow opened its first subway.

France's new\$6,000,000 liner Normandie arrived in New York on her maiden voyage. The U. S. dirigible Macon sank in the Pacific killing 83 men. The Florida Supreme Court ruled "there is no greater cruelty inflicted on man than that which is inflicted by a contentious unreasonable and nagging wife."

Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd came back from the Antartic and was greeted by President Roosevelt. Joe Louis defeated Primo Canera in New York's Yankee Stadium in six rounds. Hank Greenberg helped the Detroit Tigers win the American League pennant, and went on to take the World Series 4 to 2.

Radio star and humorist Will Rogers was killed in a plane crash in Alaska, and we were tuning in "Your Hit Parade." Eddie Cantor and Rubinoff and his violin, George Burns and Gracie Allen, and the Connecticut Yankee's "Hi hi, everybody, this is Rudy Vallee, and company."

We sang, "The Music Goes 'Round and 'Round", "The Isle of Capri," "Red Sails In The Sunset," and "It's Only A Shanty In Old Shanty Town."

Academy Award winners that year included Bette Davis for "Dangerous" and Victor McLaglen for "The Informer." Best picture of 1935 was "Mutiny On The Bounty" and the best sound-recording Oscar went to "Naughty Marietta." These memorable films had all played in Bunnell!

This was your world, Class of 1935, Bunnell High School, unspoiled, unpolluted, and - for the moment - peaceful. Was it really such a short time ago?

The Junior Class of 1936 honored this Senior Class with "Cruise of the Merry Gang" at the Flagler Beach Hotel on 3 April 1936 at the annual Banquet and Prom.

Mr and Mrs Otis Magee entertained the Senior Class at a St Patrick's Day Party at their home on 13 March 1936. A "Lucky Star" commencement party was an event of Friday night for members of the graduating class, when Mr and Mrs Tom Holden entertained at a dance in the lobby of the Flagler Beach Hotel, honoring their daughter, Altajane. The walls of the hotel lobby were covered with photographs of movie stars, mounted on star shaped cards of various colors, this and wall baskets of bright blossoms formed a background for the orchestra. A floor show, featuring

the Montgomery Sisters and a song "You Are My Lucky Star" by Clare Biddle, were on the program. Guest included the high school faculty and members of the other high school classes.

From a Flagler Tribune of 1929 the following were named as being on the honor roll in the first grade; Willie Mae Price, Vera McCraney, Elizabeth Clegg, Russell Thompson, Bill Burnsed and Carol Rodgers.

With the well equipped commercial department, as Seniors this class prepared an annual and as far as known this was the first Bunnell High School Annual.

This class sponsored a play entitled "GOOD GRACIOUS GRANDMA" with William Dmtryk directing. However according to Carol Rodgers, "it had to be postponed from original scheduled performance date. Bill Burnsed and I played 'hooky' and went hunting for a week. We returned to be suspended for a week by Prof Houck and he cancelled the play which was to be performed that week. We came close to being expelled as we parked in front of the school during class hours — big heros. I believe I still have the note that Prof sent out to the car where we were chatting with our admirers. 'Leave within 5 minutes or be expelled for remainder of year'. WE LEFT! There was enough trouble from our parents with the suspension, much less an expulsion. Bill and I were not very popular when the play was cancelled. Prof relented later after our fervent pleas and solemn promises never, ever to skip school again. We kept those promises!!"

This class also sponsored another play that went off much smoother, under the direction of Hazel Harrell, "AARON SLICK FROM PUMPKIN CRICK". This was reported to be very hilarious and a great success. That you may see the participants in this play and also recall the people and places of business in the area from the ads, the entire program is being printed.

World War II was looming on the horizon and everyone was conserving to help the "be prepared" effort when this class as Juniors in the Spring of 1941, made plans to entertain the Senior Class with the annual Banquet and Prom they were very frugal in their plans and the event was planned for the Civic Center in Bunnell and invitations were hand printed on small paper sacks with a western theme used in the decorations. The welcome was given by "Jessie James" Hunter, followed by the response from "Prairie Rose" Clegg. Entertainment included, Beer Barrel Polka - "Cactus Spurs"; Solo - "Boots & Saddle" Tucker; Old McDonald -"Barnyard Singers"; Ballet Dance - "Little Doggie Rodgers; The Last Roundup -"Last Rounders"; and "Hoe Downer - "Farmer Dan" Farmer. Daisy Buckles was chairman of the committees with preparations for this annual event with Sarah Rodgers for decorations, Lois Stafford for invitations, Hilda Sheffield for entertainment and Shelton Barber for orchestra.

This class prepared a High School Annual, the second to do so, with the aid of the equipment in the commercial department. With the interesting data contained in this annual have been able to share some of the activities of this class with you.

A SPELLING BEE was held in the Bunnell High School Auditorium between Hastings School and Bunnell School on 31 March 1944. Bunnell was represented by C. J. Muzyka and Danny Alford in the intermediate group; by Iona Moody and Barbara Morris in the junior high group; and by Wilda Strickland and Ruth Bradley in the senior high group. Bunnell won in all groups and was awarded a trophy.

The yearly magazine subscription sale for the Curtis Publishing Company was sponsored by the Junior and Senior classes with Ruth Bradley manager for the senior class and Thomas Gresham manager for the Junior class, as one of their money making projects. The Senior Class received a commission of \$41.94 and the Junior Class received \$27.88. Harold

McAlexander, Daniel Rodgers and Inez Woods received certificates of award for securing 10 subscriptions for a total of \$20.00.

The Senior Class sponsored a 'bond and stamp' drive for the school and to promote competition, two teams were formed, the "Army" and the "Navy". The school cooperated in every way for a very successful drive and total of \$1,710.05 was sold. The Navy team won with a margin of \$89.05 - the sixth grade topped the list with \$463.00 and the fourth grade followed with \$451.20. Everyone who had bought or sold a bond was given a ride in a jeep the last day.

Another patriotic endeavor with which the school assisted was the American Red Cross War Fund Drive of Flagler County. Nevoline Cowan chairman for the school with Ray Mercer her assistant. The total amount secured by the school drive was \$229.00 with fifth grade collecting \$55.77 as the largest class contribution. A prize was awarded to the following students who collected \$10 or more; Peggy Jones, Billy Decker, Joe White, Clifford Marks and David Henderson.

An undertaking that proved to be hard work but a great deal of fun was the play sponsored by the JUNIOR-SENIOR CLASSES on 10 February 1944.

A large crowd enjoyed this home town performance and it was considered a big success as the total profit was \$229.00, with the sale of advertisements for the program amounting to \$167.00 of this. The proceeds were divided equally between the two classes.

On May the 12th the looked forward to annual Junior-Senior Banquet and Prom was held at the Bunnell Civic Center. The patriotic theme was carried out during the evening. The banquet tables were arranged in a "V" shape with four tables at the tip to represent three dots and a dash. The hall was decorated in forestry with lighted tapers and spring flowers on the banquet table. The American flag, made of red, white and blue paper roses, formed a stricking background for the stage, on one side of which was displayed the Senior Class motto, "WE FIGHT TO WIN" and the other side the Junior Class motto, "UNITED WE STAND". After the banquet the tables were placed on either side of the hall, and two American Flags formed a center piece for each table for the Prom.

Because of the War, class entertainments and trips were few but the class made the most of each activity. Joyce Emery entertained with a supper and outdoor games at her home - Lillian Jones had a taffy pull at her home to be followed with a hayride - Joyce had a fudge making affair

at her home - a Sunday trip to Lake Disston for boat riding and swimming was fun despite the rain - a luncheon on the boardwalk at Flagler Beach with swimming and fishing - then a final all day party on May 25 at Daytona Beach.

With the announcement of the new Superintendent of Public Instruction, Brady Wadsworth, a hero of Guadacanal, is the reprint of a letter by him as of January 24, 1945 - "To the Students of Bunnell School - Someday when this war is over, you, who are now in school, will take over the running of this country, I hope that you will take advantage of the chance you now have at an education, so you shall be better fitted to do the job which will be bestowed upon you. I shall appreciate your cooperation with the teachers, and hope you make this school year your biggest success. I shall be glad to help you in any way possible. Respectfully yours, J. BRADY WADSWORTH, SUPERINTENDENT".

On Saturday, January 20th the Senior class gave a dance in honor of the new Superintendent. The decorations included a floral banner in the arch of the stage with a horseshoe in the center and a "Good Luck" banner to the side. Dance chairman was Lamar Mercer; decorations, Inez Woods; food, Wilda Strickland and Ruth Crosin. Room Mothers, Mrs Mercer and Mrs Woods assisted the students. Sharing the evening were faculty members, school board members and parents of the seniors.

Another item from the Bulldog's Growl - This class numbered 30 pupils in the first grade with only 7 to graduate.

They were sophomores for the turbulent year when Professor Houck died, Walter Morris was named principal only to be drafted in March and Nevoline Cowan was named acting principal, and the much anticipated annual Junior-Senior Prom cancalled,, thus with no experience to help them, as Juniors the next year, they worked hard and entertained the Seniors with a very delightful Banquet and Prom.





#### FAREWELL TO BUNNELL HIGH SCHOOL

The beautiful red brick school house that we were all so justly proud of for many, many years was badly damaged by fire on the morning of 27 June 1970. It was determined by those in authority that it was not worth saving and two years later when it was to be demolished and Superintendent Coy Harris Jr removed the cornerstone from the building the newspaper reported the following information concerning its contents,

"A time capsule type treasure was found inside a small copper box which had been cemented into the center of the heavy cornerstone block on the front of the building. The metal box contained several old coins including an 1887 Indian Head penny, pennies dates 1916, 1919, 1920, buffalo head nickels dated 1917, 1918, 1920 and a dime dated 1918.

The box also contained two messages written on Florida East Coast Railway Telegram stationary which contained the following;

'This building erected without a single imperfection' signed D. B. Brown.'

'I was born in Baxley, Ga in the year 1873, Oct 6th. Have lived in this section since 1906. Chairman of the Board of Education now . . have done my best on this building this 26th day of Aug 1924' signed W. H. Deen.

Other items in the box included a list of teachers, trustees, School Board members, County Officials, Town Council members, and then names of State Sen. W. A. McWilliams and Rep. F. L. Byrd during the 1923-24 school year."
